HINT INDICTMENT FOUND FOR CURTIS, ADMITTED HOAXER

PLEMINGTON, N. J., May 26.—(AP)—The Hunterdon county grand jury considered the case of John Hughes Curtis, confessed hoaxer of the Lindbergh case, for two hours and five minutes today and when it adjourned there were unofficial reports an indictment had been voted. One indication that a true bill had been voted was seen in a statement of Prosecutor Anthony Hauck that, if an indictment was voted, he expected to call about ten witnesses to support his case, including three police officials who testified today and Colonel Lindbergh. The prosecutor also indicated he might seek to call Admiral Guy Burgess and the Rev. Dean Dobson-Peacock of Norfolk, Va., associates of Curtis in his negotiations. While Curtis sat in his solitary cell in the jail adjoining the court house the grand jury heard three witnesses—police officials who have been active in the kidnaping investigation—tell of the confessed hoaxer's story of his alleged negotiations with the kidnapers and the effect they had on the search for the kidnap-murders of the Lindbergh baby.

Rosenbaum, of Medford.

Stock Exchange Seat Sells Low

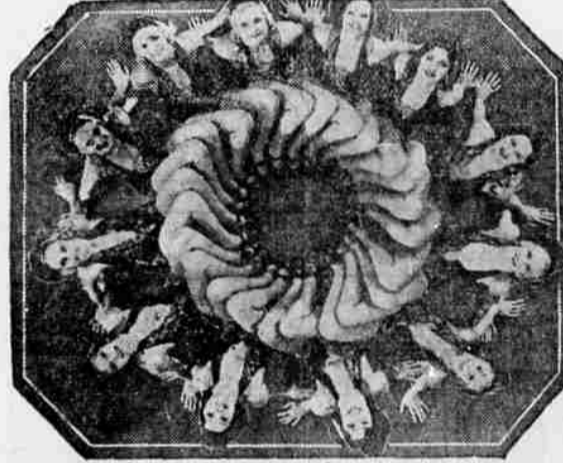

BUT wait a minute. Who is to BE THE JUDGE of these acts of mercy? Who is to make the decision whether this person or that person should be put out of his misery? An important point is involved there.

FOR example: It might seem to many people that it would be an act of mercy to everybody concerned to put this writer out of his misery, whereas to this writer himself it would seem quite otherwise.

The law, you know, acts extensively on precedent, and if we establish the precedent that just anybody can be the judge as to who is in misery and should be put out of it we shall be on dangerous ground.
