

### BUSINESS COURSE PLAN ANNOUNCED FOR UNIVERSITY

SALEM, May 27.—(AP)—Organization, personnel and curricula of the newly organized school of business administration in the Oregon State system of higher education were announced here today at the office of the state board of higher education.

Major work and the granting of degrees in business administration will be confined to the Eugene campus, thus eliminating the duplication which existed under the old system with a school of commerce at Corvallis and a school of business administration at Eugene. This consolidation is in accord with the survey made by the office of education of the U. S. department of the interior.

Under the new unified plan lower division courses in business administration are offered on both campuses, so that essentially the same freshman and sophomore work may be taken at either place. Upper division and graduate work leading to bachelor's and master's degrees in business administration and commerce are confined to Eugene, with the exception of service courses retained at Corvallis for majors in other schools. Necessary advanced courses will also be offered at Corvallis this coming year to permit present juniors to obtain their degrees without transferring to Eugene.

The work in secretarial training, leading to a certificate at the end of two years, is confined to the Corvallis campus. At the end of that period students wishing to continue for a bachelor's degree may transfer to any school of their choice on either campus.

Teacher training in business administration is located at Eugene, except that teacher training involving work in secretarial training will be accomplished by combining the two-year course in secretarial training at Corvallis with the usual teacher training subjects.

Major lines of work which a student can pursue at Eugene are general business, foreign trade, accounting, advertising, merchandising, finance, and industrial and personnel management. Combination curricula at Eugene are also provided, such as a six-year combination business and administration-law course, while at Corvallis minors in commerce are provided for those majoring in engineering, agriculture and similar technical schools. Agricultural economics, which has been taught in the school of commerce at Corvallis, has been transferred to the school of agriculture and established as a department under Dr. M. M. Nelson. Degrees of bachelor of business administration, bachelor of arts, bachelor of science and master of business administration are offered at Eugene.

### SECOND SPRAY IN BATTLE ON MOTH IS ADVISED SOON

The second cover spray for codling moth worm control on both pears and apples should be completed by June 7, according to the recommendations of L. O. Gutter of the southern Oregon experiment station and L. P. Wilcox, county agent. This recommendation is based upon information obtained from many moth traps located in various sections ranging from Table Rock to Ashland.

The materials to be used in this spray are as follows:

Apples—Inasmuch as this is the so-called peak spray for the first brood, an oil emulsion arsenate of lead combination is recommended. In mixing this spray, use one gallon of light grade summer oil emulsion one-half pound of spreader or fixator and two pounds of arsenate of lead in 100 gallons of water. When the tank is about one-fourth full of water, add the emulsion, agitate well, then add the spreader or fixator. Complete filling the tank and then add the arsenate of lead.

Pears—Use three pounds of powdered arsenate of lead per 100 gallons of water. Oil emulsion lead combinations are not necessary on pears at this time, as it is too early to attempt spider mite control.

The foliage on most trees is now becoming quite dense, care should therefore be exercised in spraying, to the end that all parts of the tree receive a good coverage.

### VALLEY FEDERAL BUILDINGS LISTED FOR RELIEF WORK

a sponsor of relief legislation, said today they would support the Garner program.

The information on the projects came from the treasury and war departments.

Hoover Is Opposed.

The Democrats of the house had met by themselves last night to hear Garner expound the plan, and to give it an informal, standing vote of approval. Accentuating the meaning of this move, was the simultaneous denunciation by Secretary Mills of the administration's flat opposition to a public works program, and to any further borrowing whatever as a "shock to public confidence."

The Garner bill would make the following allotments in the north-west for new construction work to be paid out of funds:

Idaho—Blackfoot postoffice, \$125,000; Burley, postoffice, \$100,000; Payette, postoffice, \$75,000; Wallace, postoffice, \$105,000. Eastport border inspection station, \$59,000; in all, \$464,000.

Oregon—Ashland, postoffice, \$85,000; Eugene, postoffice, \$260,000; Grants Pass, postoffice, \$150,000; Hillsboro, postoffice, \$80,000; Hood River, postoffice, \$100,000; McMinnville, postoffice, \$85,000; Tillamook postoffice, \$85,000; Medford, postoffice and courthouse, \$65,000; in all, \$930,000.

Other Oregon projects contemplated include Burns, Coquille, Cottage Grove, Dallas, Forest Grove, Gresham, Lakeview, Lebanon, Newberg, North Bend, Ontario, Sant Helena, Seaside, Silverton and Toledo.
