plied with money, the authorities say. Two women involved in the case, and the alleged cause of yesterday's fight, will be called before the grand jury to testify. The elder Lindsay claims that his home has been broken up. He was badly mauled in the melee.

Prolongs Probe.

The grand jury was expected to conclude its labors today, but the investigation of the fight will probably prolong the report until late Saturday, or the first of next week.

The Otto C. King and the Union Creek cabin cases have been examined the past two days. The King case involves the firing of a shot at a rear tire, when King, suspected of transporting liquor, is alleged to have attempted to escape in his auto.

The cabin cases concern the entry by five high school boys of summer dwellings, while on a winter skiing jaunt to the Union Creek country. The youths claimed they entered the cabins as a matter of self-protection, after being without food or sleep for an extended period. It is a mixed-up affair. It is said that the parents of the five youths have offered to make a cash settlement, but allege that the financial demands of some of the cabin owners are exorbitant and that one item is a claim for \$15 for scratching a photograph. The case has attracted wide attention among mothers and fellow students.

It is also anticipated that the Central Point State Bank robbery hoax will be a subject of grand jury investigation.
