

# HIGHWAY CLEANUP CAMPAIGN ENDED; MUCH WORK DONE

### Report On Extensive Program Made by Committee—Hope to Win Samuel Hill Prize for Jackson Co.

The Samuel Hill contest for the beautification of the Pacific highway ended last week and the coming week will be devoted to judging. Jackson county's participation in the contest was carried on under the leadership of C. L. MacDonald, chairman of the local committee, and Mrs. Mabel C. Mack, appointed secretary. The extensive program completed was announced yesterday and is submitted by the following central committee:

Community Leaders  
A local chairman was also appointed for each community along the highway throughout the county, to be in charge of the activities. They were as follows:

General accomplishments announced include mail box posts throughout the county painted a uniform color of white, straightened up, and where necessary moved into line, all inactive signs along highway removed. Others, where necessary, repaired and put into presentable condition. General improvements to all property bordering on the highway have been made by the cutting of weeds, removing debris, and a general clean-up and paint-up campaign.

Under reports of progress by separate communities are listed: Rogue River: Mrs. Effie Birdseye, the local chairman, was very active in contacting property owners and securing their aid in cleaning up premises. Approximately thirty mail box posts were painted in this community. This territory included from Rogue River to Rock Point.

Gold Hill: Residents of Gold Hill were very active in their efforts. All grass was mowed on vacant lots and along the S. P. right-of-way through the town. All cans were gathered up and all debris removed from property throughout the city. Seeds, bulbs, and plants were distributed to place along the highway to aid property owners in improving the looks of their property. Activities in this town extended from Rock Point to Blackwell hill. All mail box posts in this territory were painted.

Central Point: All mail box posts were painted in this vicinity and all highway property given a general clean up.

Medford: The owner of the Auto Wrecking place just north of the city cooperated to the extent of nicely cleaning up his place of business and removing unsightly objects from property adjoining the highway. All property owners and tenants along North and South Riverside were contacted and responded very nicely by cleaning up yards and vacant lots. Foster and Kleiser company had the grass in front of all their locations bordering on the highway through town cut and the locations generally cleaned up. Mail box posts on both sides of town were painted.

Phoenix: Secured cooperation in the matter of painting mail box posts.

Talent: Property owners responded with a general clean up. All mail box posts were painted.

Ashland: The Bellevue Grange of Ashland donated trucks to go to the state line cleaning up the highway and straightening mail box posts and painting them. All debris was removed and rubbish piled up and burned. This committee worked from the state line to near Talent.

Antioch: Deter, Roxy Ann, Sams Valley, Sterling and Union precincts failed to name a committeeman in the primary, and the vacancies will be filled by the central committee at its first meeting next August.
