Inspired by the flower show of Thursday and Friday, the largest in the history of the Medford Garden club, flower lovers from all sections of the Rogue River valley will be returning to their gardens this week, resolved to bring from the soil even greater beauty during the coming year. If sentiment spoken in tete-a-tetes at the scene of the show is any criterion.

Hope of making of the high gymnasium a permanent setting for the show, until such a time as Medford's growth demands another civic center, was also voiced in satisfied tones as exhibitors and spectators viewed the results accomplished in the gymnasium by members of the garden club and the co-operating groups from all regions of southern Oregon.

From Roseburg, Grants Pass, Ashland, Central Point and all neighboring localities, as well as Medford, flowers were brought for display by young and old, illustrating the widespread interest aroused in flower culture during the past year. And showing again that from a modest garden the most beautiful rose may be plucked, the sweepstakes prize went to Harris Jones.

In the economy table division, featured for the first time this year, were many expressions of woman's cleverness. The table, which appealed most to elderly eyes, at the same time being the envy of hosts of young exhibitors was entered by Mrs. Wm. W. P. Holt. Set in old-fashioned ware, arranged on a quaint blue plaid cloth, it seemed to invite a sweet little grandmother to sit down for a cup of tea. An old easter and blue bordered dishes, reminiscent of the long ago, were in keeping with the center bouquet in old fashioned jug.

Shadow boxes, occasional tables, a rose covered garden gate, leading into rock garden and lily pond, wall hangings entered by the Japanese colony, a bouquet of yellow columbine, flouncing spurs of five and six inches in length, a group of South African daisies, and a little yellow basket filled with pink moss roses were also high lights in the long list of beautiful entries, doubling the total for last year's show.
