

# Double-Header Baseball Billed for Fairground This Afternoon

## G. PASS, MEDFORD J'VILLE AND TALENT TEAMS IN FRAY

Benefit Affair Will Start at One o'Clock—Locals Add New Talent in Attempt to Knock Over Cavemen

The double-header scheduled for 1 o'clock this afternoon at the fairgrounds between Grants Pass and the Medford Eagles and Talent and Jacksonvilles is expected to draw the largest crowd of fans attending a baseball battle in the valley this season. The double-barreled affair is billed as a benefit for Mrs. John Logan, whose husband, the well known southern Oregon athlete, passed away recently. Logan and Jacksonvilles teams and his former teammates are taking the opportunity today to express in a substantial way the high regard in which he was held.

Cook will hurl for Grants Pass in their clash with the local lodgemen and the latter outfit has been strengthened by the addition of new talent calculated to give the Cavemen a real contest.

Jacksonville and Talent will put approximately the same lineups in the field which have turned out to be a high class brand of ball so far this season. Both teams will enter the fray anxious to wipe out old scores.

A large box of Whitelaw's chocolates will be handed the players making the first home run in each game and the heavy-stickers are all set to give the first one over the pan a long ride.
