After leaving Medford the planes will proceed to Portland, where they will remain overnight, going from there to Vancouver, B. C., the northernmost point of their journey.

They expect to return to Los Angeles June 1. A number of nationally known pilots are participating in the tour, and a large number of different types of planes will be seen.
