CHICAGO—(AP)—The wings, seemingly the simplest structure of an airplane, in reality are made up of nearly half of the 153,000 parts necessary to complete a modern tri-motor air liner. A count of parts in a tri-motor operated on a coast-to-coast route shows 149,000 parts exclusive of motor. Of this number 85,485 parts are standard rivets, bolts, screws and nuts. But there are 54,485 parts in this plane that had to be made from original drawings, and all parts must have one or more inspections, though the rivets are tested in lots by dipping in a solution which causes them to turn black if of the required duralumin alloy.

POISON GAS KILLS PESKY SQUIRRELS

LIVERMORE, Cal.—(AP)—Poison gas is being used in Alameda county to kill rodents. T. S. McGraw, in charge of the work, has found it better than poison grain. The device to kill ground squirrels was developed by McGraw and Al Schmitt. They perfected a machine which burns straw and sulphur and forces poison gas into the ground. Tests proved it 96 per cent efficient, while grain is from 40 to 60 per cent effective. Twelve sacks of straw are used as fuel, and the machine operates at a capacity of 40 pounds of crude sulphur a day. Several lines of hose are inserted in aquired holes and the gas pumped in after being generated in a steel tank.

VICAR OF ROME BARS ELECTRIC ALTAR LIGHT

ROME—(AP)—Use of electric lights on altars in Rome churches has been prohibited by Cardinal Marchetti Selvaggiani, vicar of the city. Electricity may be used for illumination of the church itself, but only candles are permissible on the altars. The orders do not apply to the thousands of little shrines on street corners and in private homes.

FLYING BIKE TESTED BY GERMAN AVIATOR
