

'APRIL THE FIFTH' RANK OUTSIDER IS WINNER IN DERBY

100 to 6 Shot Shows Heels to Flower of British Three Year Olds - Favorite Fails to Hold Hot Pace

EFSON DOWNS, Eng. June 1.—(AP)—April the Fifth, given only an outside chance to win, today outclassed 20 of England's best 3-year-olds, winning the 1932 running of the derby.

As April the Fifth, carrying the silks of T. Walls, flashed across the line three-quarters of a length in front of the Aga Khan's Dastur, W. M. G. Singer's Orwell, the choice at 15 to 8, finished far back in the field. Lord Roseberry's miracle, second choice at 100 to 9, was third, a head back of Dastur.

Although rated by many as a money horse, April the Fifth was considered to have no better than a 100 to 6 chance to defeat Orwell, winner of the two thousand guineas and champion juvenile of the English turf last year. Dastur was a rank outsider at 15 to 1.

The victory of April the Fifth, owned by Tom Walls, movie star, trainer and all-around sportsman, came as a complete surprise to the estimated crowd of one million, including the king and queen and other members of the royal family.

The result showed what many turf experts had predicted—that Orwell would not stand up under the grueling test over the one and one-half miles. April the Fifth, sired by Craig an Eran out of Bold Again, traveled the up and down hill journey in 2 minutes and 45 seconds.

Dastur missed Chance. The Aga Khan, Indian potentate, just missed winning his second derby in three years, when Dastur failed to overhaul the fast traveling April the Fifth in the stretch. Blenheim won for the Aga Khan in 1930.

E. Desmond's Royal Dancer, the only member of the derby field to win a race over the Downs course this season previous to today, was fourth, beating out the Aga Khan's other entry, Firdausi.

Orwell, famed for his early speed, was well up among the leaders for the first part of the difficult journey, but weakened when the real test came.

May Change Name. Walls, who recently returned from the South Seas, said he was considering changing the name of the winner from April the Fifth to "June the First."

The crowd, said to be one of the largest in the long history of the blue ribbon turf classic, was favored by the weather. There were sporadic showers, but they failed to dampen the enthusiasm of the multitude, which packed the huge grandstand and jammed every available standing space on the downs.

Despite the defeat of Orwell, his first in eight starts, Walls was given a tremendous ovation as he led his colt from the track. The only other time Orwell had been defeated was in his first race as a two-year-old last year.

Portifino Leads at Half. At the half-way mark, Lord Derby's Portifino took command with Firdausi, Cockpen, Miracle and Orwell within striking distance. When the field reached the Tattenham corner, the critical point in the race, Portifino was still out in front.

A quarter of a mile from the finish line, Dastur bounded to the front setting a fast pace. April the Fifth was running strongly on the outside, however, and in the last hundred yards caught the Aga Khan's color bearer and won going away. Dastur just managed to stave off the mad rush of Miracle.

Orwell gradually dropped behind in the stretch run, finishing ninth. Victor Emanuel's Totig and Richard Croker's Celebrator and Corey, the American-owned horses, were far behind.

BIANCONE BARRED FROM FOOTBALL

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 1.—(AP)—Because he played one game of soccer football in Portland during the Christmas holidays last year, Johnnie Biancone, sparkling quarterback on the Oregon State college football team, has been declared ineligible for competition next fall. BASEBALL BRAWL COSTLY FOR WHITE SOX PLAYERS

CLEVELAND, June 1.—(AP)—It will cost four members of the Chicago White Sox good money for their affair of fistfuls with Umpire George Moriarty and the veteran arbiter can nurse with severe reprimand as well as his injuries.

President Will Harridge of the American league, after an investigation of Moriarty's battle with the six here Memorial day in which the umpire suffered a broken right flat and Fletcher Milton Gaston was knocked out, last night handed out penalties and censured all around.

Manager Lew Fonseca of the Sox was fined \$500. Pitcher Gaston was assessed a like sum and suspended 10 days, and Catchers Charley Berry and Frank Grube were penalized \$200 and \$100, respectively. In addition, Coach Johnny Butler was suspended five days without pay for "use of profane language" toward Moriarty.

Moriarty, who broke his hand on Gaston's jaw and proclaimed himself ready to fight the whole Chicago team, was "severely reprimanded for neglect of duty," Harridge announced. The league president held that according to Moriarty's own story, the umpire should have chased Fonseca and Berry from the game before the trouble started.

(By The Associated Press) Portland is in second place in the Pacific coast league today after beating Oakland yesterday. Los Angeles slipped back to third place by losing to San Francisco. Hollywood maintained its hold on the top position by winning from tall end Missions.

The Missions started out well against Hollywood in San Francisco by scoring three runs off six hits, but Page settled down and scattered half a dozen hits over the balance of the game. Lucas yielded six hits and four runs in the first two innings, but stuck it out to allow only three hits the rest of the way. It made little difference, however, as Larry French was pitching almost unbeatable ball for the Pirates.

The battle for top position in the National remained at a standstill, as both Chicago and Boston won. Lusty hitting by Heinie Manush in the extra innings enabled the Washington Senators to take a hot one from the Philadelphia Athletics, 5 to 4, and go into a virtual tie with Detroit for second place in the American.

Tony Freitas, a left-hander from Sacramento, made his debut for the A's and pitched elegant ball until he was relieved for a pinch hitter in the tenth. The day's only other contest in the American resulted in a 6 to 5 victory for the embattled Chicago White Sox over Cleveland.
