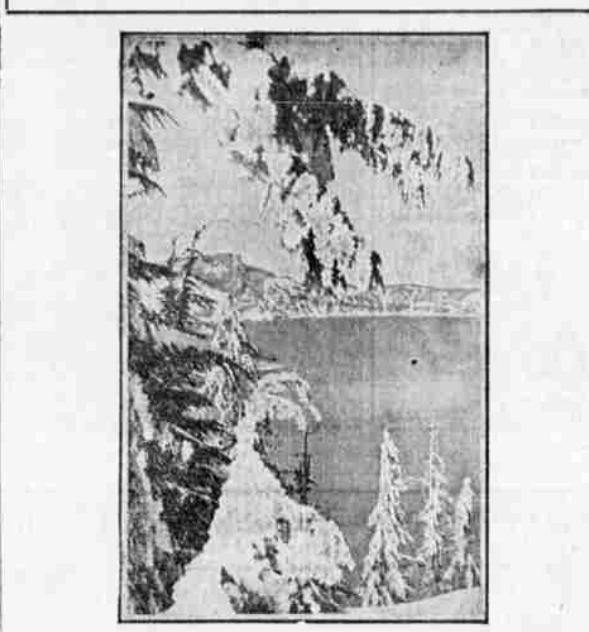
Carole Lombard at Craterian Theatre
