

# Mail Tribune Trap Shoot Set for June 12

## SCATTERGUNNERS FROM WIDE AREA WILL PARTICIPATE

### Annual Competition for Trophy Dated at Medford Gun Club Traps—Other Events Scheduled for Day

The third annual Mail Tribune trapshooting tournament will be held over the Medford Gun club traps at the Municipal Airport Sunday, June 12, firing to start at 10:30 a. m. and invitations are now being broadcast for the event which in the past has drawn many of the coast's best "pigeon busters."

Included with the Mail Tribune trophy shoot there will be competition for the Chester Wood handicap, in honor of Chester Wood, well known Prospect, Ore., sportsman, with cash awards. The Chester Wood purse is another feature of the day's program and will be shot for in the 50-target handicap event. A first time winner will receive \$10 and a second time winner will receive the entire purse less the original starter which now amounts to \$16.

The Mail Tribune trophy was placed in competition in 1930 and is to be shot for each year over the local club's traps at 100 16-yard targets. Any amateur trapshooter is eligible to compete for the fine trophy and anyone winning it three times becomes permanent owner. The tournament is registered under authority of the Pacific International Trapshooting association.

Lunch will be served on the grounds on tournament day and a great turnout of both scattergunners and spectators is expected for the event.

## LOMSKI, SAWYER TO BATTLE HERE ON ARMORY CARD

Medford fight fans, long without entertainment in their favorite sport, will be served a tasty dish at the Armory Wednesday, June 15, in the initial offering of Mack Lillard, newly authorized by the city boxing commission as promoter. An all-heavyweight card with Leo Lomski, "the Aberdeen assassin," and Frank Sawyer, present heavyweight champion of Canada, in the ten-round top spot, will be staged by Lillard with two six-round battles, the participants yet to be signed, and a six-round semi-final between Terry Kileen and Milo Dixon, "pride of Kerby."

"Circus" Red Howe, Marshfield, sensational newcomer to flatie circles, will swap punches with Al Anderson, young Portland heavy in a six-round special event.

Lomski needs no introduction to followers of the fight game and his match with Sawyer should prove a "natural" for entertainment. Sawyer recently fought ten rounds with Jimmy Bryne, Marshfield flash, the latter gaining an unpopular decision. Sawyer has been fighting main events in Vancouver, Tacoma and other Puget Sound cities. He weighs 205 pounds and is six feet three inches tall. Lomski will give away considerable weight in the match, as he is expected to scale 185 pounds.

Kileen fought Frank Werneke here some time ago and has a record in southern Oregon rings where he follows the fight racket as a side line, being regularly employed by the highway department in the vicinity of Roseburg. His opponent, Dixon, is the idol of Kerby fans and this match will draw a large delegation from Kerby, Grants Pass and Roseburg, it is expected.

## TRIPLE BASEBALL CLASH SCHEDULED FOR NEXT SUNDAY

With the postponement of the benefit baseball game to Sunday, June 5, being given for Mrs. May Kell Logan of Gold Hill, another tilt has been added to the schedule, according to announcement issued by Louis "Scoop" Puhl, secretary of the Rogue River Valley baseball league.

All misunderstandings between the Grants Pass team and the other members of the league have been cleared up, following a visit to that city by Puhl and Pat Foley, manager of the Medford team, who conferred with George Young, Grants Pass baseball manager.

The schedule for Sunday now stands with an additional game on the program at 11 o'clock, between Gold Hill and Hit, Puhl said. Seven innings are to be played, and all three of the contests may be seen with the one admission ticket.

At one o'clock, the afternoon program will open, with Talent playing Medford, and Jacksonville in the field against Grants Pass.

Due to the rain last Sunday, the benefit, being given for John Logan's widow, was postponed, and early in the week misunderstanding arose from the Grants Pass contingent, who expressed the belief the regular schedule should be followed, eliminating the benefit games.

However, the conference with the manager smoothed over the situation, and the Cavemen have stated they are willing to participate in the Sunday encounters.

Logan, who died recently from pneumonia, was employed at Hit, Calif., and previous to his illness, was playing for the Hit baseball team.

He was well known throughout the valley where he took a prominent part in the baseball leagues, and had also played on prep teams in Portland. Logan also became prominent during his school days at Oregon State college, as a baseball player.

## G. O. P. DRY PLANK WILL BE POPULAR

WASHINGTON, June 2.—(AP)—Postmaster-General Brown, a high counsellor in the Hoover ranks, expressed the opinion today the Republican platform prohibition plank would be one "to which we all can subscribe."

Brown has been classed as among those cabinet members who want other than a strictly dry plank.

He did not elaborate his view today on the exact nature of the plank expected to be had, but again reported progress being made on the platform as a whole and indicated an expectation that both those who favor national prohibition as it stands and those who lean toward a change would be satisfied.
