

NEGRO MISSIONARY PROTESTS HOLDING MEETING IN TEXAS

Presbyterian Clerics Urged to Refuse Attendance Where Black Men Not Treated As Brothers

DENVER, June 3.—(AP)—The record books of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A., held the accomplishments of the church's 144th general assembly as ministers and elders scattered to their homes in all sections of the country and to missionary posts in far corners of the world. Before the assembly was dissolved yesterday by Dr. Charles W. Kerr, of Tulsa, Oklahoma, moderator of the church, the commissioners chose Fort Worth, Tex., for the 145th assembly next year.

A protest against holding the assembly in the Texas city was recorded by the Rev. Irving W. Underhill, negro missionary. He urged the negro delegation to refuse to meet "in any place where a negro can not be treated as a man and a brother." There was no discussion on the protest which was recorded in the assembly records.

Church leaders saw in the results of the assembly sessions several outstanding developments. Included were the decisive voice of confidence given the general council and existing government of the church and the admission of women to the general council for the first time in the church's history.

Dry Stand Affirmed
The commissioners were also emphatic in their desire that the church continue relations with the federal council of churches of Christ, despite opposition from a fundamentalist group. The church reaffirmed its unequivocal support of the 18th amendment and opposition to attempts to repeal or nullify the prohibition laws. The assembly gave tacit approval to supervised practice of eugenics, the church holding that "children have the right to be well born."

Ministers of the church were reminded of new responsibilities in coping with prevailing social and industrial conditions.

WILLIAM SLOAN DIES IN PHOENIX

William J. Sloan, a resident of Phoenix for the past 12 years, passed away at his home there Thursday evening at the age of 72. He was born at Ashland, Ohio, Nov. 1, 1859 and came to Jackson county from Halesburg, Kansas. He was an ardent member of the Phoenix Presbyterian church where he served as elder during his entire residence there.

He leaves three children, Delno Sloan and Elizabeth Carpenter of Phoenix and Don A. Sloan of Hutchinson, Kansas. One brother, A. L. Sloan of San Bernardino, Calif., one sister, Mrs. E. L. Breyer, Hutchinson, Kansas. Also six grandchildren.

Funeral services will be conducted by Rev. Iverson at the Conger chapel at 2:00 p. m. Saturday. Entombment will follow in the Medford memorial mausoleum.

JOSEPHINE GRANGE PLANS CANNERY

GRANTS PASS, June 3.—(Sp)—Masters of all Josephine county granges, with the chairmen of the home economics and agricultural committees of each grange have been called to a meeting at the county courthouse at 1:30 Saturday afternoon to consider a canning project with County Agent Howell and Mrs. Wertz, home demonstration agent.

A cooperative community cannery plan will be discussed, Howell said Thursday, and if found advisable plans laid for the preservation by this means of all foodstuffs in county gardens which might otherwise go to waste this year.

The proposal, Howell said Thursday morning, would be a cannery that would be moved among the communities, rather than one which would require each community to bring its produce to any central location.

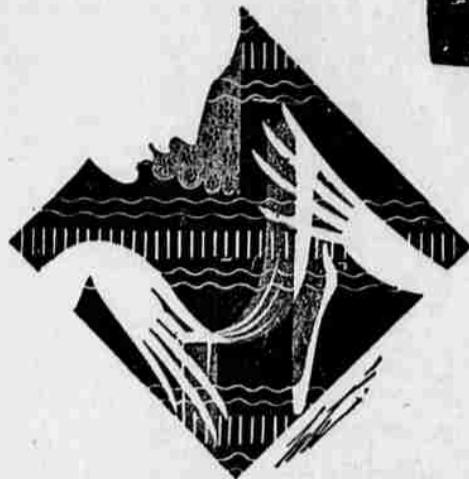
Complete physical examinations were given all to determine their fitness to enter school, and toxin anti toxin was given several children to protect them against the germs with which they may come in contact upon entering school.
