FOUR DROWN AS FLOOD ROARS O'ER HOMES IN NIGHT

with another. There was an unerring report of another woman's body on a railway trestle which could not be reached and a woman and child were reported drowned in Melrose park in the far south part of town.

Hours of darkness in the southern suburb of Capitol Hill and the failure of seven thousand telephones and 60 toll lines added to the terrors of families struggling to leave their flooded homes. Some looting was reported in downtown business streets where basements were flooded.

The body of a 5-year-old boy was taken from the water in the southeast section.

A man on horseback who attempted to cross deep water near the Taylor school for boys, where 65 youths were marooned upstairs, was reported drowned.

The backing up of flood waters caused a shutdown on nearly every well in the north end of the Oklahoma City field, as well as pipe-line and gas compressor stations.

The community camp, tent city of jobless and the Lightning Creek Bottoms appeared hardest hit. Houses were swept away and persons sought refuge on roofs and in tree tops.

At the camp refugees waded out through water neck deep, fathers and mothers carrying children on their shoulders. Invalids in some sections were taken out in ambulances. One woman was reported trapped in a cellar in the camp.

The rain kept coming down at midmorning, although the flood waters had receded.

Her back broken and in a cast, one woman was removed from the community camp through water two feet deep. Three children with broken legs also were carried from the camp.
