

LOVE MAD YOUTH GIVES SACRIFICE TO FIRE GODDESS

That Kalaua was the scene where ancient islanders plighted troths in death. The volcano is not now in active eruption. There is no record of any other deaths in Halemauau, and whether Hawaiians once offered human sacrifices to Pele by hurling the victims into the fire pit is a moot question.

The fire goddess was unquestionably the most feared of all the island deities, and in olden times none dared to approach the pit without first making offerings of ohelo berries. Halemauau, commonly referred to as the house of everlasting fire, means "house of ferns," so named because ferns were thrown into the crater to appease Pele's wrath.

SARAH HULL WILL UP FOR PROBATE

The will of the late Mrs. Sarah A. Hull, pioneer resident, was filed today in circuit court for probate. Mrs. Hull died May 22 last, and the will was made in January, 1931.

The bulk of the estate is left to two great-grandchildren, Clifford S. Beckett and Ruth E. Beckett of Eugene. The will provides that they share alike in all real and personal property, after other provisions have been fulfilled.

Frank H. Hull, a son of Chico, Calif., is left a promissory note for \$250, and \$5.

D. E. Millard, of this city, is left a combination desk and bookcase belonging to the deceased. The will named Millard as an arbiter, by one clause, if a certain contingency, now passed, should arise.

The will also provided that Clarence Pierce of this city, be named as executor. J. W. Wakefield, Henry Currier, and Pauline Roberts are appraisers of the estate.

BIG SLUMP SEEN IN GASOLINE USE

SALEM, June 3.—(AP)—Decrease of 2,863,370 gallons of gasoline was reported in the total sales for April in Oregon as compared to the same month a year ago, the secretary of state's office reported today. The decrease in gasoline tax receipts was \$121,586. The secretary of state announced the readjustment following the "price wars" in March caused much of the decrease. The total gasoline sales for April was 11,565,306 gallons resulting in tax receipts for the month of \$477,029. For the first four months of 1932 tax revenues amounted to \$1,907,710 on almost 47,000,000 gallons, or a decrease in receipts of \$49,878 from the first four months of 1931.

M'GRAW RETIRES FROM LEADERSHIP

NEW YORK, June 3.—(AP)—John McGraw today announced his resignation as manager of the New York Giants after 30 years of leadership. He gave ill health as the reason. He will be succeeded by Bill Terry, the club's firstbaseman. McGraw will remain as vice president and stockholder. The 89 year old pilot of the Giants has been in ill health for some time, frequently being unable to actively manage the team.

GARNER RELIEF PLAN FAVORED

WASHINGTON, June 3.—(AP)—The house ways and means committee today favorably reported the \$2,300,000,000 Garner relief program. Immediately thereafter, the democratic leadership called the party members to caucus at 4 p. m., to consider what action to take on the measure. Speaker Garner said he planned to bring the measure up for consideration in the house Tuesday, provided the democratic caucus approves.

DR. POLING RESIGNS TO BECOME EVANGEL

PORTLAND, Ore., June 3.—(AP)—Dr. C. C. Poling, pastor of the First Evangelical church of Salem steps down from his pulpit, next Sunday night to become a traveling evangelist. This was revealed today at the forty-ninth session of the Oregon Evangelical conference meeting here this week. Dr. Poling is the father of Dr. Daniel A. Poling of New York City, editor of the Christian Herald and international president of the Christian Endeavor.

HAUSNER STARTS SECOND ATTEMPT TO FLY ATLANTIC

HAUSNER lifted his plane into the air after running 3500 feet down the concrete runway, passing about 80 feet over a small crowd assembled to see him off. As he gained altitude he turned the plane around and headed eastward. A navy plane also accompanied him as an escort. He carried 50 letters, some of which he planned to drop over the Crofton airport near London, and, if conditions were favorable, he hoped to fly over Le Bourget, Paris, to drop some. His plane carried 525 gallons of gasoline, and he took along four chicken sandwiches, two ham sandwiches, a gallon of coffee and a gallon of water. Hausner appeared cool as he superintended the final turning up of his plane. He took out his watch, kissed his wife goodbye, and then calmly said: "Well, let's go." A moment later he was off.

RASKOB DENIES SHORT SELLING

WASHINGTON, June 3.—(AP)—John J. Raskob was charged with short selling today and promptly denied the charge, but added that he thought short selling properly when "properly conducted." The chairman of the Democratic national committee, questioned before the senate banking committee by its counsel, William A. Gray, said he always had more long stock in his regular account than he sold except in two transactions in which he admitted that he was "technically short." Gray pointed to one particular sale in 1927 which he said was a short transaction and asked why Raskob sold the stock. "For some personal reason, I suppose," Raskob replied. "For income tax purposes to establish a profit or loss."
