McCaskey Garden Party Enjoyed By Many Rose Lovers

Through a garden—true to the fondest dream in interpretation of the word—Medford flower lovers walked and lingered yesterday afternoon at the invitation of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. McCaskey, southern Oregon's leading factors of the rose, on pathways where the choicest blooms in perpetual surrender to the breeze, which visit the hills of the Old Stage road, waft their fragrance generously upon the air.

Members of the Medford Garden club and friends were included in the tour among climbers and bushes, numbering more than 700. Guests called from 4 o'clock on, flitting the garden under ever changing shadows, and paused for tea on the spacious McCaskey lawn before returning to the city.

From garden gate, overhung with yellow clusters to the uppermost pathway, which leads to the Corral, did not fail in granting first honors to the coral petals, a steady stream of visitors moved from rose to rose.

Claiming favorites, only to deny them for other flowers, opening their petals further down the rows, many guests departed unable to name the most exquisite rose. The masculine members of the party, however, did not fail in granting first honors to the white roses of the garden, the flaming red, which illuminates the garden.

The Duchess of York, an immense pink blossom, Mrs. Dunlop's Best, a pink with a hint of sunrise, topping the edge of the petals; and Madame Butterfly in bush and climber, were also claiming favorites. Wild roses of China, Persia and Japan, were seen enjoying growth in southern Oregon soil. French roses, whose petals furnish the fragrance for the leading perfume of that country, are also found in the McCaskey gardens.

A bit of history, too, is recalled as well as the flowers of other countries in a variegated pink and white rose, the York and Lancaster, associated with the close of the War of the Roses.

The Australian Black Boy with petals of velvet texture was the recipient of many words of praise as were the Zeppin Droughtin, Bourbon, which dates back to Shakespeare's day and the host of others too numerous to name, which add to the beauty of the perfect afternoon.

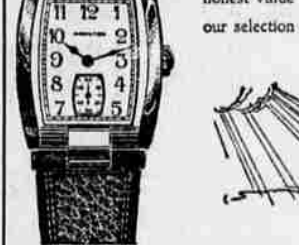
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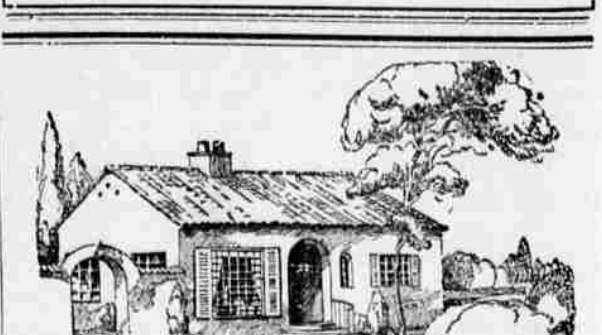

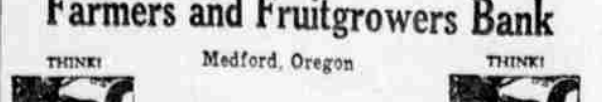
