

# STRANGE DEATH OF MRS. KOEBER CALLED SUICIDE

HILLSBORO, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—A verdict of suicide has ended the coroner's investigation of the death of Mrs. Elizabeth Koerber but has not necessarily closed the case as far as the district attorney's office is concerned.

Deliberating only ten minutes, a coroner's jury last night found the 78-year-old woman burned herself to death in the basement of the Free Methodist church here last Wednesday. Mrs. Koerber was found by her daughter, the Rev. Nathalia Koerber, pastor of the church, but died without making a statement.

When Mrs. Koerber was found, testimony revealed, her body was unclad and seated by fire. Splinters and bits of wood were found in her mouth and throat under a large cloth "rag." Dr. J. O. Robb, who attended Mrs. Koerber, and Dr. Frank R. Menne, pathologist from the University of Oregon medical school, testified Mrs. Koerber, suffering from the burns, might herself have thrust the bits of wood and cloth into her mouth. They said no marks of violence were found on her body aside from lacerations in her throat.

Funeral service will be conducted from the Peri Funeral home June 10 at 2:00 p. m. Rev. E. Iverson officiating. Interment will take place in the Siskiyou Memorial Park.

Hoover and Naomi Vangross, from which the school district appealed, Justice Kelly in his opinion upheld the lower court.

Contracts regarding the power of the board to make contracts only which conform to the budget cannot be implied in the absence of a statutory provision for such restriction.

The opinion further held the lower court jury returned a special verdict stating plaintiffs did not engage in any conspiracy in their activities in soliciting votes on matters pertaining to the school, as charged by appellants, and that no reversible error was found in the court's instructions to the jury.

Edmiston Wins  
Other opinions handed down today included:

Florence E. and James E. Edmiston, respondents, vs. H. W. Kierstead et al. defendants, and R. O. Stephenson, appellant, appeal from Jackson county. Suit to foreclose executory contract for sale of real property. Opinion by Justice Kelly. Judge H. D. Norton affirmed.

Petitions for rehearing, were denied in Burgess vs. Wing Agency.

The suit of J. E. Edmiston and wife against Kierstead, was a case wherein the Edmiston's sold orchard property to the Kiersteads, and later were forced to foreclose. While the Kiersteads were in possession they purchased lumber from the Economy Lumber company of this city, to the amount of approximately \$300. The Economy Lumber company held that the Edmiston were responsible for this sum for improvements on the property. Judge Norton denied the plea. An appeal was taken, and Judge Norton was sustained.

# 5 AIRMEN BOAST 10,000 AIR HOURS

A study of the flying by transport pilots in 1931, made by the aeronautics branch of the commerce department, showed that they spent a combined total of 1,558,515 hours in the air.

# MACHINERY COMPANIES SWAP WITH FARMERS

AMARILLO, Texas.—(AP)—Farm machinery companies have shown a marked willingness to barter with farmers in the Panhandle.

They have offered up to 80 cents a bushel for wheat, 50 cents for corn, and from 8 to 10 cents a pound for cotton in exchange for machinery.

# JANITOR'S SALARY TOPS PRINCIPAL'S

CHICAGO, June 7.—(AP)—There's at least one school in Chicago where it's more profitable to be janitor than principal.

Dr. George D. Strayer, Columbia University expert in school administration who has made a survey of the Chicago schools, told a meeting of 4,000 teachers yesterday the head janitor of one school was being paid \$3,750 and the principal only \$4,000.

"Not all the incongruities I have ever seen," said Dr. Strayer, "a head janitor getting more than a principal takes the prize."

# RAISE FOOD, ADVICE TO COTTON FARMER

STILLWATER, Okla.—(AP)—Farmers in Oklahoma's cotton belt have been urged by the Oklahoma A. & M. college extension division to raise food for themselves and feed for livestock this year rather than another cotton crop.

With the largest cotton carry-over in the history of the state, farmers will be unable to depend on this crop alone for a livelihood, a pamphlet being distributed warned.

# WHEAT AND COTTON FOR POOR APPROVED

WASHINGTON, June 7.—(AP)—The Federal bill to authorize the distribution by the Food Crops for relief purposes of 40,000,000 bushels of wheat and 800,000 bales of cotton from farm board stores was approved unanimously today by the house agriculture committee.

The legislation is similar to the bill passed last winter releasing 40,000,000 bushels of wheat, with the exception that authorization of funds necessary to liquidate outstanding commercial loans against this wheat and cotton would be authorized.
