SOVIET POWERS TO TRIPLE PAY OF PARTY MEN

Stalin and Other High Officials Are in Line for Pay Raise if Political Bureau Acts On Proposal.

By Stanley P. Richardson MOSCOW (AP)—Joseph Stalin and other high officials of both the government and communist party will be in line for a 200 per cent raise in salary if the political bureau, the party's all-powerful governing body, adopts a proposal it is considering.

It has under advisement an increase in the maximum salary to which all party members now are restricted from 300 to 900 roubles monthly (nominally \$150 450).

Few Get Top Pay If the increases are adopted, it is probable that they will not be announced publicly, only those affected being notified. The communist party numbers more than 3,000,000 in the total population of 160,000,000.

The increase would apply to every member of the party, although only a few would benefit by the top figure, just as only a few today draw the maximum of 300 roubles. It would mean proportionate boosts all down the line, however, from Stalin, the virtual dictator, to the lowest subordinate.

Under the present system all party members, whether officials or plain wage earners, are limited to the 300 rouble maximum for their regular jobs. Even if they happened to be in a position to earn more they could not get it.

Expediency Upsets Ideals Because of the present high level of prices this has resulted in many sacrifices and sometimes in actual starvation on the part of those whose responsibility is greatest in the soviet state.

Many communists have found it necessary to increase their regular earnings by writing and lecturing, a practice which the party permits provided the recipient donates to the party half of the money he gets on the side. But of course these men were unable to give their undivided energy to their regular jobs.

A more serious consideration is that many well equipped party members have refused to accept important posts because as assistants they commanded just as much pay as their chiefs without having to shoulder the responsibility. Much of the men which goes with every high position, Stalin Gives Cue

Above all these reasons, however, and giving the political bureau the highest sanction to consider the matter was the edict of Stalin, last June, that the system of equal pay for all should be abolished in the soviet state. That rapidly is being accomplished in all forms of industry and agriculture.

The compromise of communitarian principle with capitalist practice also was dictated by economic expediency for Stalin realized that maximum production could not be had in the present state of development without distinguishing between the ability of skilled and non-skilled workers by monetary standards.

DASHES OF COLOR BRIGHTEN HOUSES IN MURKY LONDON

LONDON.—(AP)—Dashes of color, real color, not just pastel shades, are being used to brighten gloomy London homes and buildings.

Doors and window sills are being painted carmine, saffro or green. One fashionable hotel has apple green sills, the interior of its elevators a tulip red, while of four chairs at a table in the dining room one will be red, one orange, one yellow and one green.

Real estate agents state they find it much easier to rent, and get more for a house or flat which has a green or carmine door, with a silvered knocker to add a touch of solidity to the gateway.

Not all Londoners, born and bred to formal greys and blacks, take kindly to the change. There was a howl of protest when the former commissioner of works, George Lansbury, painted bathhouses on the Serpentine, in aristocratic Hyde Park, a bright orange, and the new government is repainting them a moderate green.

The Marquis Merry del Val, last Spanish monarchist ambassador at the embassy in Belgrave Square, may have seen the "Face for London and not have known it. In the patio enclosure between the embassy and chancery buildings there is a red tile fountain court, surrounded by flowerpots of bright red, yellow and purple, a bit of old Spain hidden in the midst of this sooty capital.
