

CINCINNATI REDS' BUBBLE BURSTS WITH LOUD BANG

Seven Straight Defeats Chalked Up for Howley's Squad After Runaway Start in Pennant Chase

The Cincinnati bubble, one of the prettiest of the spring crop, appears to have exploded in Manager Howley's lap.

Seven straight defeats have removed the Reds from the first division and dropped them into seventh place.

Chick Hafey's illness, which has deprived the club of its clean-up hitter, and Pitcher St. Johnson's inability to take his regular turn, have contributed to the Reds' rapid tumble.

They committed four errors in the first four innings yesterday to lose their second to Bill Terry's revived New York Giants, 9 to 2. All the Giants' runs were unearned.

Cubs Up Again

The see-saw scrap for the league leadership saw the Chicago Cubs bounce up again by defeating the Brooklyn Dodgers, 7 to 5, in 14 innings while Boston was taking a 15-8 beating from the St. Louis Cardinals.

Charlie Root, relief pitcher for the Cubs, held Brooklyn to one hit for the last six innings of their struggle and finally was rewarded in the 14th when Gabby Hartnett tripped and Bill Jurgens doubled to drive across the winning runs.

The Cardinals pounded four Boston pitchers for 20 hits in scoring their fifth straight victory.

The Phillies took a free-scoring affair from Pittsburgh, 11 to 10. Dave Barbee provided three Pirate runs with a home run in the ninth.

Southern Go Good.

The two eminent southpaws, Vernon Gomez and Bob Grove, continue to burn up the American league in their battle for individual pitching supremacy. Gomez won his 10th victory in 11 games as the Yankees took a close one from Detroit, 5 to 4. Grove scored his 11th victory of the year and his 10th in succession in beating Cleveland, 3 to 1.

Grove gave the A's their winning run with a homer in the eighth. Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig knocked in all five Yankee runs, each hitting a home run and a single.

The day's most timely blow was delivered by Charlie Berry of the Chicago White Sox. Two were out in the ninth inning and the bases filled when he tripled to center and thereby defeated Washington, 3 to 2. Goose Goslin delivered a home run, a triple and a single and drove in four runs as the St. Louis Browns crushed Boston, 11 to 4.

The match ended with Savoldi's spectacular flying tackles in 6 minutes 39 seconds. The bout was featured by much rough work. Thye introduced a new one to the fans, bringing a rib-cracking blow with his elbow into play.

Jack Patterson and Nick Elch each took a fall in the five-round semi-final, Patterson taking a fall with a body slam, Elch winning his with a cross-body press. Elch, who has made himself popular with wrestling fans here, gave away much weight to his opponent.

SARAZEN EQUALS LINKS RECORD IN BRITISH TOURNEY

SANDWICH, Eng., June 9.—(AP)—

Gene Sarazen, long hitting New York professional, tied the course record at Prince's with a 69 today to take the lead in the second round of the British open golf championship with his 77-69-139.

Tommy Armour, defending champion, finished with a 70 and 145 just as Gene was starting out, and his fellow American's fine performance stimulated Sarazen to do his best.

Gene was out in 35 and home in 34 for a card five under par.

Peroy Allis, British professional, was the closest to the American among the early finishers with a 71 for a 36-hole total of 142.

Sarazen had birdies at the second, fifth, 12th, 15th, 16th and 17 holes and was over par only once, on the ninth hole.

Sarazen failed to set a new record because he half smothered an approach shot to the home green where he had an easy four in eight for a 68.
