### LAWYERS TO AID ROOSEVELT STUDY WALKER CHARGES

**ALBANY, N. Y., June 10.**—(AP)—Two eminent lawyers whose names are withheld for the present, will aid Governor Roosevelt in his study of the analysis of the evidence concerning Mayor James J. Walker of New York submitted by Samuel Seabury, counsel to the legislative city investigating committee.

The governor said last night that he had selected the lawyers but had not communicated with them. Their services will be purely formal, he said.

Although declaring he intended to act on the Walker case with utmost speed, Mr. Roosevelt declined to indicate when concrete action might be forecast. Study of the eight volumes of evidence will require two or three weeks, it is believed. It is considered unlikely that any decision will be reached until after the democratic national convention, at which Roosevelt is a candidate for the presidential nomination of his party.
