

COX WOULD NIP DEMOCRAT RIFT OVER CHAIRMAN

Former Governor Says Rejection of Shouse Would Be Studied Humiliation—Wheeler Favors Walsh

DAYTON, O., June 10.—(AP)—Former Governor James M. Cox today issued the following statement: "The attempt to throw the national democratic convention into a bitter controversy over the permanent chairmanship should be checked before it gets far on its mischievous way. There should be a militant protest from all parts of the country against the development of any symptom of such folly.

"In the present instance the national committee, which in the very orderliness of things must make preliminary arrangements, found two names before it for temporary chairmanship, Messrs. Shouse and Barkley. Happily a compromise was effected, one being given the temporary and the other the permanent assignment.

"The rejection of Mr. Shouse would be nothing short of studied humiliation of a man who has given his time and his talents in furtherance of the most successful reorganization of any political party in half a century."

WASHINGTON, June 10.—(AP)—Senator Wheeler of Montana, an advocate of Governor Roosevelt of New York, today replied to the statement of James M. Cox, of Ohio, with firm notice a contest would be made to establish Senator Walsh, of Montana, as permanent chairman of the democratic convention in place of J. J. J. Shouse.

"I don't see anything mischievous," he said to newspapermen, "about refusing to place someone in a position so he can continue his fight to prevent the nomination of the unquestionable choice of the democrats of the country."

M'NEAL TO QUIT COACHING NORMAL

J. A. Churchill, president of Southern Oregon Normal school, has announced that R. W. McNeal, for six years coach of the normal, may discontinue his duties in that department to take over the geography department.

Mr. McNeal has secured leave of absence for the summer term to continue work on his Master Degree in geography. An effort is being made, according to President Churchill, to secure a coach capable of teaching biology. A vacancy occurred in the geography department with the appointment of Professor Walter Hordt as dean of the institution. President Churchill is to become director of elementary teacher training for the three normal schools in Oregon.

DEMOCRATS NAME COUNTY LEADERS, PREDICT BIG YEAR

Democrats of southern Oregon organized yesterday afternoon, preparatory to the November campaign, when members of the Democratic Central committee of Jackson county met at the Hotel Holland to elect officers and outline their stand for what promises to be one of the biggest years in the history of their party.

Support was pledged to all county, state and national candidates, running on the Democratic ticket, in resolutions passed at the gathering, one of the largest in many years, staged by Jackson county's Democracy, Frank DeSouza, local attorney, was re-elected Jackson county chairman, Maxwell S. Martin of Ashland, secretary, and Dr. Chas. T. Sweeney, treasurer.

J. E. Barkdull was chosen state committeeman and J. R. Bowen, congressional committeeman. Committee appointments will be made in the near future by Chairman DeSouza.

No favorite was named for the presidency by the Jackson county delegation, the members agreeing to lend their support, undivided, to the choice of the Democratic convention, which they expect to be the next president of the United States.

The meeting was characterized by a revival of anticipation and enthusiasm, lacking for some time in the southern Oregon Democratic ranks.

OREGON DRIVERS HIGH ON SAFETY

Oregon is one of the nine states who lead in highway safety states Ray Conway in an article on highway safety in the current issue of the Oregon Motorist, Official publication of the Oregon State Motor association. In fact, the first month's experience under the 'rules of safety' showed an unprecedented decrease in highway casualties.
