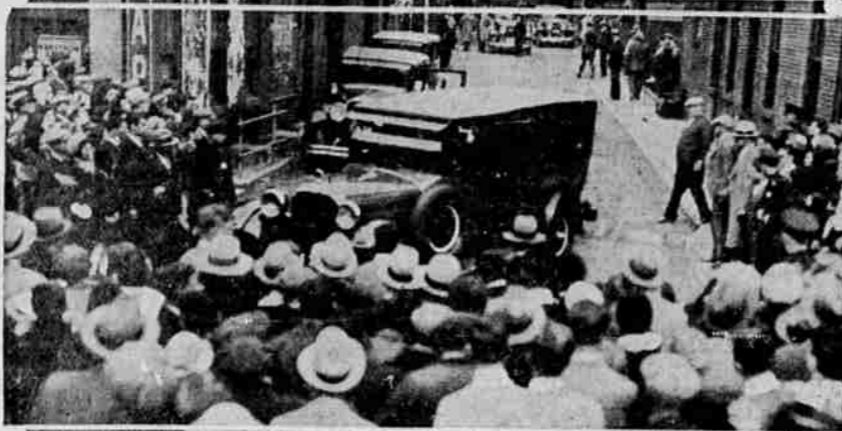

**Fly, Fly, Fly**



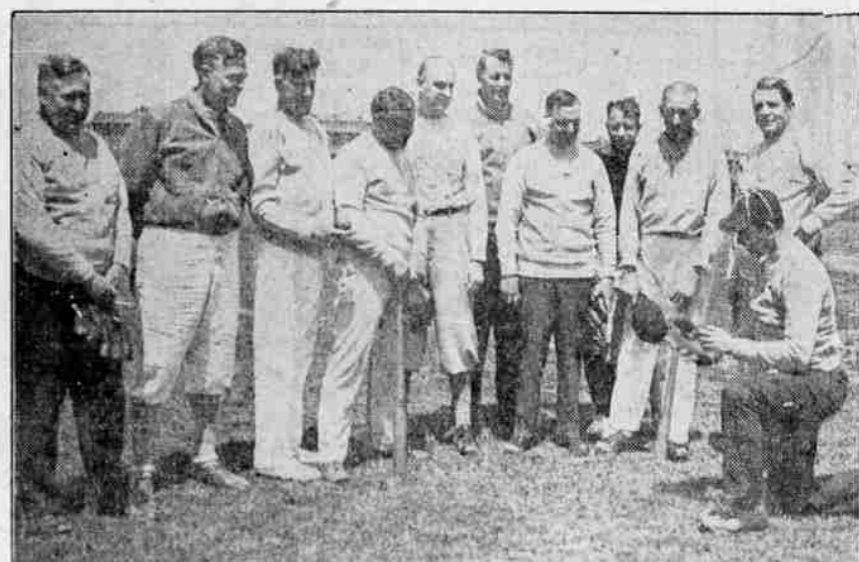

**JAPANESE SLUGGER MEETS YANKS**



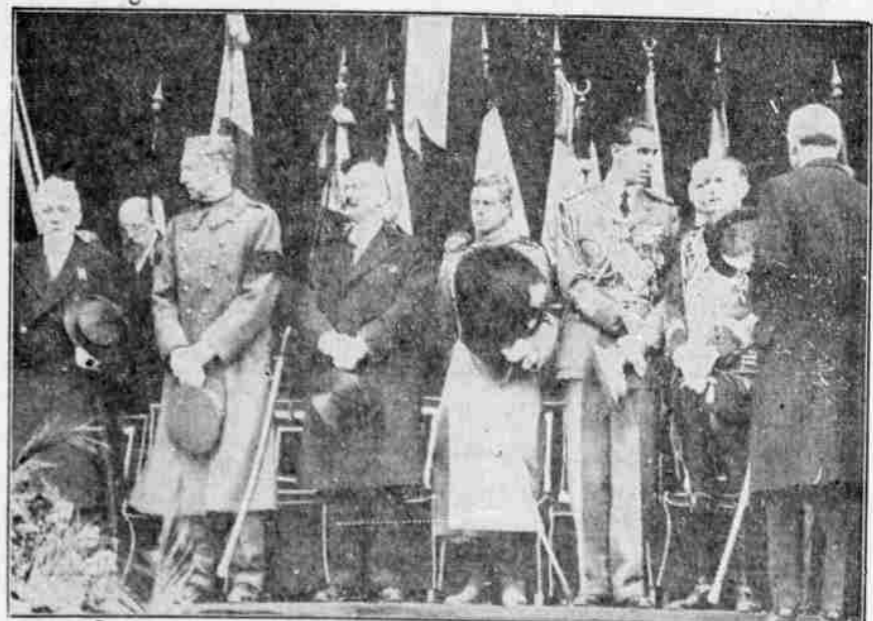
