RED CROSS DISPLAYS PRODUCTS IN WINDOW CHAMBER COMMERCE

FUNERAL SERVICE AT 2:30 P. M. FOR GUSTAVE WESTON

Sergeant Gustav Weston, a well known figure in western military circles, and a resident of Medford since 1915, was found dead in his bed at his home, 52 Peach street, Friday morning where he was believed to have died of heart attack without arousing from sleep.

Born in Wurtemberg, Germany, February 26, 1863, he was 69 years old. He had been in almost continuous military service since entering Company H, Second regiment of Infantry as a private in 1886. He was promoted to the rank of sergeant of the First regiment of Cavalry, Troupe G, in 1902, and had continued in that rank until his death, being subject to call when ever his country might need him.

While Theodore Roosevelt was president of the United States, Sergeant Weston acted as his guide at Fort Yellowstone, and told many interesting stories of events centering around Roosevelt's visit, which are remembered by his many friends in Medford.

January 18, 1921, Sergeant Weston married Mary Edwards, who survives him, in this city. He is also survived by one daughter, Katherine, 10, and a brother, Julius Weston of Philadelphia, Pa.

He was a member of Colonel Sargent Post, No. 31, Medford, members of which will conduct the military funeral services for their departed comrade at the Perri home at 430 1/2 this afternoon. The sermon will be delivered by Rev. Geo. P. Kabele of the Lutheran church, assisted by Rev. T. H. Theunler, chaplain of Colonel Sargent post.

Interment will be in the Medford cemetery.

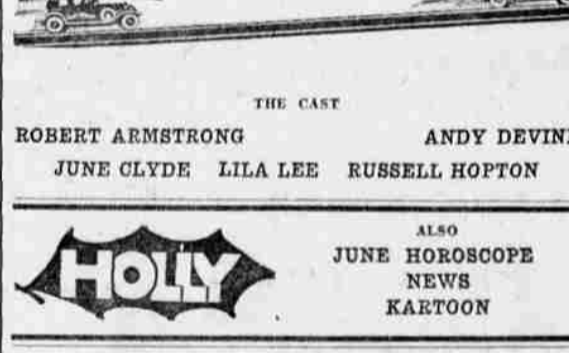

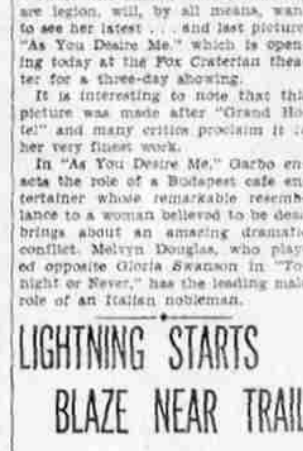
