Divers Take Gold From Sunken Ship After Long Fight

BREST, France, June 11.-(AP).-First fruits of two years of struggling to wrest a fortune of \$5,000,000 from the bottom of the sea were reaped today when divers from the Italian salvage ship Artiglio II rose above the surface with \$45,000 from the hold of the sunken steamer Egypt.

The gold, in bullion form, represents a quest which cost 15 lives and two strong ships. The fight has been one of the most spectacular battles of man against the sea.

The steamer Egypt was rammed and sunk off the French coast by a cargo steamer in 1922.

Toward the impregnable heights of Dutton cliff came the craft, almost touching its age old walls not far above Phantom Ship, strangely anchored at its base.

Around and around circled Captain Yancy, paying flying visits to Garfield Peak, Sun Notch, Kerr Notch, Cloudcap, the Winglass and all points outstanding among attractions of the rim.

A dip and a rise and then higher came the ship as it bid farewell to the lake, flying directly over the lodge, still snow-covered and over the cafeteria with its canyons of snow leading to its doors.
