

JUNK ATTEMPTS TO HURL DOUBLE WIN OVER DUCKS

Portland Castoff Trims Former Mates in Opener, 4-2—Cracks in Seventh Inning of Nightcap

"Junk" Walters, Seattle pitcher, looked back today on the feat of pitching two Sunday baseball games against Portland, the team that sold him for \$1000 as "old junk." He was only 50 per cent successful, however, in his private warfare, winning the first game, 4 to 2, but dropping the second, 0 to 4.

Elated by the promise he would be allowed to pitch the second game if he won the first, Walters started out well. He allowed seven hits, the same number his team mates gathered, but Seattle made two safe blows in the fifth inning count for three runs, which clinched the game.

Cracks in seventh.

Despite a scorching sun, "Old Junk" did well in the second game until the seventh inning, when Portland touched him for three runs. The Indians gathered only four hits Seattle took the series four to three.

Los Angeles beat Hollywood, 4 to 3, in their Sunday afternoon game after losing the first six games of the series. The stars won the first half of the doubleheader, 3 to 1. Los Angeles won the last game by gathering five hits from two pitchers in the seventh and final inning to tally four runs.

The tail-end Missions gave the downtrodden Sacramento Senators two more setbacks, 10 to 9 and 11 to 8. In the opener the Missions tied the score at 9 all with six runs in the seventh inning, and pushed over the winning tally in the tenth.

Oakland took the opener from the Seals, 2 to 1, when Bill Ludolph, Acorn hurler, drove out a single to score the winning run in the 13th inning. The Seals won the second game, 3 to 2.

BILL BATES WINS TRIBUNE'S TROPHY IN TRAP TOURNAY

Veteran of Medford Club Breaks 97 'Rocks' in Annual Event—Pease Wins Handicap and Makes Run

W. W. ("Bill") Bates, veteran trapshooter of the Medford Gun club, won the Mail Tribune trophy Sunday with the fine score of 97 out of 100 blurocks on the club traps. G. W. Houston and E. N. Hardenbrook, both of Klamath Falls, were close competitors with 96 out of 100. Bates' victory returns the coveted cup to the local club until the next annual shoot, it having been in possession of the Klamath club since last year.

E. W. Pease, Medford, won the 50-target handicap event by breaking all of the "birds" from the 21-yard line. J. H. Martin of Klamath Falls, was second in this feature with 48 "breaks". Martin was high in the doubles event with 23 out of his 12-pair, an excellent score.

Pease Runs 100

Pease added to his laurels for the day by carding the longest run during the shoot, cracking 100 "rocks" without a miss. This feat entitles him to a medal from the Pacific International Trapshooting association. Pease's achievement has only been duplicated once before over the local traps. Sid Newton carding a run of 100 a few weeks ago. Newton was not a participant in Sunday's shoot owing to a recent operation for appendicitis.

Cash prize winners in yesterday's program were W. W. Bates, \$10 for high gun in class A; G. W. Houston and E. N. Hardenbrook \$5 for second place in class A; F. C. McNelly, Coquille, won the \$10 prize in class B after two shoot-offs with Herbert Tilley, Medford. The \$5 second place money went to Tilley.

Pease won the \$10 purse in the handicap and \$10 for first time winner of the Chester Wood purse. Second prize of \$5 in the latter event was garnered by J. H. Martin, Klamath Falls.

There was a large crowd of spectators in addition to the participants. Ideal shooting conditions prevailed throughout the tournament.

Killefer's outfit won both games of a double-header yesterday, 2-3 and 4-0, and boosted their average above the .500 mark for the first time this season.

In the National league, the Chicago Cubs stretched their lead to a game and a half by winning a wild 13-inning battle with the Boston Braves, 5-3.

One of a large group of St. Louis Cardinal graduates, Flint Rhem, pitched the Phillies to an easy 6-1 victory over the Cincinnati Reds. The other two National league games were rained out.
