AMAZING STORY OF WAR CARRIED IN GREAT FILM

It is no wonder that Luis Trenker wrote "The Doomed Battalion." His own experiences in the war were so bizarre, so dramatic, so full of pathos and heroism, that it had to take some form. His first form was that of a novel, almost as widely read in Europe as "All Quiet on the Western Front," but even that did not suffice.

In "The Doomed Battalion" Trenker does not play the role that he enacted in real life. As a matter of fact, he was the captain of the heroic band of the heroic soldier-quad, who volunteers to re-visit his native village to ascertain the exact moment when the mountain which they were 'as fending, is to be blown to atoms.

Here is Luis Trenker's own story of his war experience. The analogy between this story and the story of "The Doomed Battalion" is as close as may be, with due deference to dramatic emphasis and literary license.

When I was twenty year old, I was a mountain guide in the Australian Tyrol. I had lived all of my life in these rugged mountains. In the little village of Cortina d'Ampezzo.

One day another guide came to me saying, "Go quick to the village-war has been declared." Austria had declared war on Siberia. That night 400 mountain men, including myself, were loaded in box cars. I was shot through the thigh in one of the attacks, enough to send me to the hospital. When I got out, I found Italy had entered the war, and the problem of the defense of the Tyrol confronted the Austrians. I was called by the High Command and commissioned to recruit the Kaiser-Jagers from picked mountain men.

We went into position in the Dolomites, the mountains I knew so well just an hour or so's journey from my own native village. It was my duty to hold these positions at any cost, a difficult assignment, because the Italians had companies of similar skill assigned to take these very commanding peaks.

We went into position on Mt. Lagazuoli, which frowned down upon Cortina, from where most of the men had come. Cortina then became the division headquarters for the occupying Italian forces. We couldn't see them down there, but could fire a shell or a shot because the men's eyes and children and cattle were all down there.

We knew that the Italians had been ordered to take Mt. Lagazuoli; because of all the peaks, it was most strategic. Opposite it was a peak named Tofano. To show how hard it was to capture these inaccessible peaks which were of such vast importance, twelve of our men held Tofano for a whole year.

Upon this peak we endured many hardships. We were 12,000 feet high. It was winter and bitter cold. We couldn't dig in very much because we were practically solid rock, but we blasted out caves and sought shelter there. Continually we were under a heavy bombardment from the Italians who were resolved to shell us out of business.

In the winter of 1915-16, there was a terrific snowfall, about twenty feet deep. This saved us from any Italian attacks. The Italians lost as many men this way as we, if not more, because they were on the lower slopes and received the full force of the avalanche.

One day one of the lookouts noticed a lot of black specks in the snow beneath. Investigation proved that the Italians were drilling a tunnel thru the mountain, to undermine our position-tunneling up through the solid rock-later, we heard them drilling. This continued, day after day and we knew they were coming closer and that soon they would place their charge of dynamite and blow us all to bits. It was a terrific strain. We could hear their drills but could do nothing about it. The men became almost insane with suspense-couldn't sleep and got in hysterical quarrels with one another. Meanwhile, the high command insisted that we hold Lagazuoli at any cost. We waited in all twenty-two days.

On the 22nd of June, 1916, it was a moonlight night, clear and beautiful. Suddenly there was a deep rumble and the whole mountain top quivered and burst into pieces. Blue flames shot out in all directions and stones as large as houses rained down. Fortunately, we were away from the main center of the explosion, and only lost seventy men. I believe the Italians lost more than that. Immediately the Italians attacked, but we were ready for them and held our position. It was doubtless the most spectacular thing in the entire war, although few knew about it.
