Margaret Lenore Coates, one of the leading home economists of the west who recently joined the staff of home economists assisting Mrs. Julia Lee Wright, national director of the Safeway Homemakers Bureau, is entertaining the women of southern Oregon this week at the Homemakers' Bureau cooking school. A crowd of women enjoyed her first session today when party making and quick entrees were the subjects of her pleasing lectures. Tomorrow she will discuss new and novel party recipes and tasty dishes for buffet suppers.

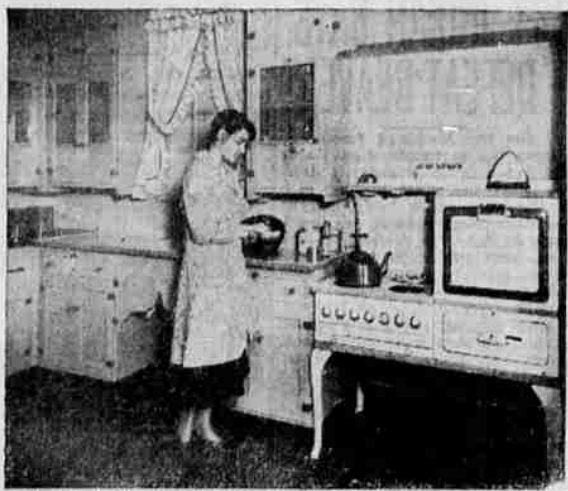
The diminutive cookery expert made a real hit with the housewives who attended the opening day of the Tomemakers' Bureau cooking school. She is a former Oregon State girl and is considered an authority on home economics.

Following one more school after the Medford sessions, Miss Coates will leave for an extended journey to Europe where she will study foreign dishes.

Miss Coates will offer a number of new dishes in the serving of typical western fruits and vegetables and take into consideration the desires for a pleasing variety without the spending of too much time when she lectures at the Fox Rialto theater.

One of the greatest problems of the western housewife, according to Miss Coates, is that of providing foods for the family that are sustaining yet not too rich and heavy. Another problem of the homemaker which Miss Coates characterizes as almost universal, comes from the lack of meat knowledge. She believes that only one out of every hundred women can ask for a cut of meat by its correct name. One way she suggests to learn the correct meat cuts is to go marketing personally, and learn to know the market man. She says: "Make a friend of your meat market man and your meat bill will be far less for he will help you select cheaper cuts and tell you ways of preparing them so that they taste just as good as the more expensive steaks."

ELECTRIC RANGE CONTRIBUTES TO KITCHEN SAVING

Analysis of what most housewives regard as waste (the water poured off of meats and vegetables after ordinary cooking) has been proven by chemists employed by food conservation authorities to contain minerals, salts, natural juices, etc., equivalent to approximately 20 per cent of the food value of a product cooked in open pans over flame and immersed in water to prevent scorching on the sides of utensils. Proponents of Electric Cookery—"The modern method of food preparation," claim a saving in food cost by reason of the "waterless" methods employed in electric cookery. With closed utensils to prevent moisture loss through steaming and no pouring off of excess water, the electric method they claim is the economical method.
