AUTOISTS OBTAIN TEMPORARY TAGS Issuance of temporary permits for 1932-33 auto license plates was started this morning by the sheriff's office for a score of autoists. The temporary permits are orange colored and must be displayed on the windshield. The first of the new licenses were displayed in this county today on the autos of the state police. The governor and secretary of state are scheduled to issue a statement within the week setting forth there will be no moratorium on auto licenses because of the state of the times. The state police have been directed to make a check on all foreign licenses on trucks and passenger cars.
