HOOKUP TO TELL PLANK'S MEANING

CHICAGO, June 16.—(AP)—The first member of President Hoover's cabinet to take to the country an explanation of the prohibition plank adopted last night by the Republican convention will be his secretary of state, Henry L. Stimson.

The secretary, who helped to frame the plank, will spend 15 minutes tonight in telling over both networks of the National Broadcasting company what the plank, stripped of its legal phraseology, means. He will speak at 7:15 p. m. (P. S. T.) from the Chicago studios.

EXTORTION TRIO TRAPPED, SLAIN

CHICAGO, June 16.—(AP)—Three of four men who allegedly tried to extort \$25,000 from a downtown gambler under threats of kidnaping him walked into a police trap this afternoon and were slain. One was identified as Harold Parker of St. Louis.

The triple slaying occurred when the men staged a bribe fight with police hidden in an office adjoining that of Morris Schecter, proprietor of a horse race gambling book at 208 North Wells, on the northwestern edge of the loop. Patrick Roche, chief investigator for the state's attorney, participated in the shooting.

SISTERS SUICIDE TO AVOID PRISON
