

# OREGON'S GROUP UPHELD WISHES OF ELECTORATE

## Delegates Feel Klepper's Proposal For Unanimous Nomination Of Hoover Has Approval Back Home

CHICAGO, June 17.—(AP)—Oregon delegates to the national republican convention were convinced today they had upheld the wishes of the Oregon electorate and had conformed to the May 20 primary, despite the circumstance that Joseph Irwin France of whom they were nominated was soundly defeated and ignominiously removed from the convention platform.

For after casting 9 votes for Hoover and 3 for France, with one absent, State Senator Milton Klepper proposed the motion which was unanimously approved, calling for unanimous nomination of President Hoover. Twelve Oregon votes, with one absent, were cast for Curtis for vice president.

France Promised Badge  
The nascent conflict which developed into action on the floor resulted from the purported agreement made by part of the Oregon delegation with

Senator France whereby he was to withdraw from the presidential campaign and nominate Calvin Coolidge. To do this France was promised an Oregon alternate's badge, with accompanying credentials. These credentials never reached the desk of the national convention chairman and would have been valueless if they had reached his desk, since to be a properly accredited delegate or alternate from any state a person must be a resident of that state. France, a Marylander, thus could not qualify.

His battle with Chairman Snell for recognition has become history. It followed the nominating speech by L. B. Sandblat of Oregon, France's campaign manager in a one-sided primary election in which France's was the only name on the ballot.
