

DESTITUTE GIVEN PRACTICAL HELP BY CHURCH HERE

To the Editor: The Four Square Light House, at East 5th and Riverside, north, under supervision of Misses Estelle Jones and Abbott, is submitting the following items of its activities June 1 to 15:

During this period 49 shoes, 14 boxes of toiletries have been given away to destitute local families. All of which has been donated by friends of the commissary for the relief of the needy. Numberless calls were necessarily turned away because the supply of food and clothing had been exhausted.

It is pitiful to witness the pleadings of those who, without employment or funds, come to the light house for aid.

It is the desire of the management to be of great service to the unfortunate of our own community, but in order to do this it has become necessary to ask the public to come to our aid with cast-off clothing, canned fruit, bedding, mattresses, food of all kinds, and especially a refrigerator which some one could spare is greatly needed.

Also donations of money are appreciated. Not alone do we try to supply the needs of the body, but also bring messages of hope and cheer to discouraged and helpless people.

From morning till night the commissary is in operation, and then at the night services many are given spiritual blessing.

We are anxious for the public to become acquainted with the work we are carrying on in this city.

The management works without pay or salary. The only object is to be of service to the needy during these distressing times. Anyone having articles for the commissary call the light house or bring to East 5th and North Riverside.

No charge is made for anything. Everything is given free, under proper supervision.

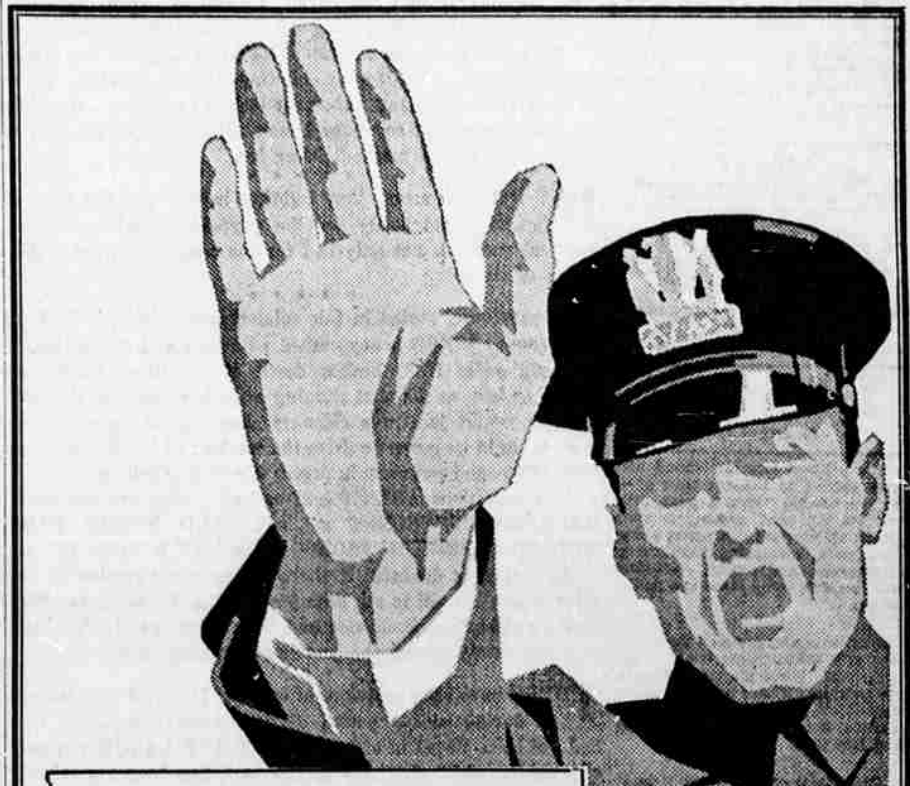
TRAFFIC IS BLOCKED BY SWARM OF BEES
