EGG PRICE TAKES ONE CENT LEAP IN SHRINKING SUPPLY

PORTLAND, Ore., June 23.—(AP)—Advance of 1c a dozen again in the price of eggs here effective this morning was generally maintained by the trade during the day. A sharp decrease in the supply was the factor which created additional strength in the home situation, although little improvement is noted elsewhere. With extras up to 16c a dozen generally by the general trade, the entire market's undertone has assumed strength. Reports in the trade suggest that with another advance in price, cold storage holdings will begin to come out in small volume. Make of butter continues to hold up despite the reports of individual churners of a big cut in the output here. Market for chickens continues to show nothing but extreme slowness. Receipts are not heavy but appear more than adequate for all immediate needs. Killing operations are contracting. Eggs of the season's apples have been received in Portland. The initial shipment of Transparente from Kennebec are reported, priced \$1.50 half-apple box. Sagging trade trend is continued in the market for tomatoes here with an surplus of offerings but with an increasing call. There appeared a weaker tone in the market for strawberries with liberal supplies of very good quality. Prices in general were 5 to 10c lower. Raspberries were also lower, while loganberries were hard to move even at \$1. The latter appeared general low for currants.
