TAMMANY KNIFES ROOSEVELT

Comment on the Day's News

PRESIDENT HOOVER says to the world at large: "Let's cut our expenditures for armaments at least a third, and thus save in the next ten years from ten to fifteen BILLION dollars that otherwise will go to pay for something we don't really want."

THEN he adds, in substance: "If we will refrain from spending this huge sum for something we don't want, we WILL HAVE IT to spend for something we DO WANT."
It sounds like a good proposition, doesn't it?

WHAT DOES THE WORLD WANT?

Well, in this writer's judgment, the common, ordinary, everyday people of the world want stable business conditions and employment at good wages, so that they may get for themselves a fair and reasonable share of the good things of life. They can't have these things if too much of their money has to be taken away from them in order to pay for extravagantly costly preparations for war.

SUPPOSE you live in a block with half a dozen other families and that all of you have some money you would like to go down town and spend for new clothes and food and tickets to the movies and perhaps a new chair for the house.

But you CAN'T, for you are all suspicious of each other, and each of you fears that some dark night one of the others may go on a rampage and break down your doors and come in and murder you in your beds.

So you feel that you are compelled to spend your money for locks for your doors and guns and ammunition in order to be in a position to repel such an attack.

You wouldn't be very happy under such circumstances, would you?

NOW suppose that one of your neighbors, wiser than the rest, calls you all together some day and says:

"Look here, boys; we're all bankrupting ourselves buying guns and ammunition to protect ourselves against each other, spending so much for these things we don't want that we haven't money enough to buy the things we DO want. So let's cut out at least a third of what we're spending for guns and ammunition."

"If each of us will do that we'll all be just as well off as before in the way of protection, and with the money we save we can buy a lot of things we've been wanting and haven't been able to afford."

THAT is exactly what President Hoover is proposing, and if nations had anything like as much sense as individuals his proposition would be accepted IMMEDIATELY.

UP IN Baker county, according to the Democrat-Herald, gold mining is more active than at any time in the past several decades. The hills are full of prospectors and some exceedingly good-looking ore is being brought in.

Similar reports are coming from gold mining districts all over the West.

ROOSEVELT FOES BATTLE TO KEEP TWO-THIRDS RULE

Followers Half Dozen Presidential Camps Rally to Oppose Move to Abrogate Convention Vote Rule

CHICAGO, June 24.—(AP)—James A. Farley, leader of the Roosevelt forces, today declared the fight to abrogate the two-thirds rule would be carried out, rejecting Senator Harrison's appeal to drop the contest.

CHICAGO, June 24.—(AP)—Anti-Roosevelt warriors from half a dozen presidential camps rallied today around the time-worn standard of the two-thirds rule to resist the confident march of the Rooseveltians against it.

Threats of a third party came from both sides and the row over the platform. Governor Murray of Oklahoma, one of the presidential contenders, said abrogation of the rule would mean the breakdown of the party.

A university institution told the resolutions committee failure to take a clear, unequivocal stand on economic issues would result in a new party being set up.

Protests held in the presidential camps of most of the candidates, including Garner, Byrd, Smith and Traylor, there came protests against abrogation of the rule. Senator Glass of Virginia joined them.

The girls are from 11 to 13 years of age. The quartet, in bathing suits, in a rowboat were rowing on Rogue river when one of the oar-locks became dislodged and fell into the river, just as the boat was hit by the swift mid-stream current. One of the girls was thrown overboard.

As soon as Josephine Bullis reached shore, she notified her elders, who were at the Dr. B. R. Elliott cabin. None of the girls were any the worse for their experience.

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WOULD BAR SMITH FROM CONVENTION UNLESS REPENTS

Tennessee Bourbon Leader Roiled by AI's Refusal to Pledge Support for Whoever Party Nominates

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 24.—(AP) J. M. Gardenhire, a delegate to the democratic national convention, announced today he would sponsor a resolution to deny former Governor Alfred E. Smith the privileges of the convention floor and to declare him ineligible as a presidential candidate unless he will abide by the action of the convention and support its nominee.

Gardenhire, councillor general of Tennessee, and a Smith supporter four years ago, issued a statement for the former governor for his "remarkable interview." In Chicago "he which he declined to say whether or not he would support the nominee for president to be made at the democratic convention in Chicago next week."

SHOCK TO DEMOCRATS

"The democrats of the nation," Gardenhire added, "must have been amazed and shocked" at the interview.

The statement continued: "It is almost unbelievable that former Governor Smith would assume such an attitude, especially in view of the fact he has been showered with favors and honors at the hands of the democratic party. His utterances in said interview were arrogant and dictatorial, evincing an utter disregard of the party's welfare."

"Let us hope that Governor Smith really did not intend to convey the impression that he would refuse to support the nominee. Probably he intended to threaten and coerce the convention only. A stinging rebuke should be administered to this arrogant and defiant man by the democrats at Chicago."

HITLER DEMANDS RED SUPPRESSION

MUNICH, Bavaria, June 24.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler today demanded establishment of martial law throughout Germany as a result of continuing political clashes which this week have cost ten lives.

Furthermore he demanded the communist party be suppressed and that the police, especially those in Bavaria, be purged of socialist and centrist members.

"The hour is at hand," he warned. "It is five minutes before twelve."

DUTRA BLOWS UP ON SECOND ROUND

FRESH MEADOW COUNTRY CLUB, PLUMING, N. Y., June 24.—(AP)—Olin Dutra, California star, lost the lead in the United States open golf championship today by going to pieces on the last nine and finishing his second round in 77 strokes, which with his opening 69 put him in third place with a total of 146.

Tied for the lead at the halfway stage were Jose Jurado, Argentine ace, with 74-71—145 and T. Phillip Perkins of New York, former British amateur champion, now a pro with 76-69—145.

EX-CENTRAL POINT STORE KEEPER IN COUNTERFEIT PLOT

Clyde C. Carey, who formerly operated a second hand store at Central Point, and has kinmen residing in the Gold Hill district, is held by the federal authorities in San Francisco on a counterfeiting charge. Carey is alleged to have manufactured bogus dimes, and to have maintained his "plant" in Central Point. Investigations conducted by the state police and federal aides failed to reveal whether or not he had passed any spurious coins in this section.

In room in the back part of his Central Point establishment was found a considerable quantity of chemicals, plaster for molds, and other utensils of his alleged criminal trade, the state police investigation shows.

Six weeks ago Carey disposed of his second-hand business to Al St. John, a pensioned war veteran, but before the deal was closed and when St. John was looking the place over, Carey cautioned him against entering the room which was padlocked. He warned St. John also not to touch any of the bottles as they contained deadly poison, and to be particularly careful that they did not fall into the hands of children.

Carey departed in his auto with another man, and took all the chemicals and aluminum from which the dimes were alleged to have been made, with him. He gave St. John a demonstration of his ability with chemicals, and told him that he was working on an invention, as the reason for keeping the room under lock and key.

Before leaving, Carey told residents of Central Point that he was going north, but instead headed south, where he was apprehended by federal agents, and is held in the jury term of the federal court at Sacramento, Calif.

BATES PLEA WAITS RETURN OF JUDGE

F. A. Bates, Gold Hill miner, whose mine controversies have been aired locally to a large extent, will enter a plea next month upon the return of Circuit Judge H. D. Norton from Oregon City, where he will hold court next week. An order was signed yesterday by the court delaying the pleading until Judge Norton is back. Circuit Judge E. C. LaTourrette of Clackamas county will hold court here next week, hearing the case of Niedermeyer, Inc., against the Pacific Record-Herald and Earl H. Fehl for mortgage collection. Judge Norton was disqualified on an affidavit of prejudice filed by Fehl.

Bates stands indicted on a charge of "threatening to commit a felony" and is at liberty on bonds furnished by L. A. Banks, orchardist, and his daughter, Mrs. Margaret Lund.

R. C. Buck, transient youth, was sentenced to ten days in the county jail on a charge of petty larceny when he appeared before Judge Glenn O. Taylor in justice court today.

He was arrested on a warrant issued by W. Gaddis of Astoria, who charged the youth with stealing a number of tools. Buck was arrested near Roebuck.

HAWLEY DECIDES NOT TO PROTEST MOTT SELECTION

The veteran legislator trailed Mott by 239 votes in the primary election last month. Should Hawley contest the vote it would require his presence in Oregon, making it impossible for him to return to the congressional session, Glover announced. This Hawley does not wish to do. Hawley has been in Portland attending the head camp session of the Woodmen of the World.

The congressman expects to return to Washington by plane.

SOVEREIGNS HELD AS HOSTAGES BY REBEL MILITARY

Royal Palace Surrounded by Rebellious Soldiers and Sailors—Commander of Army Killed by Rebels

BANGKOK, Siam, June 24.—(AP)—A constitutional monarchy was established in Siam today after a sudden but brief revolution in which one man was killed.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—(AP)—Kenneth Potter, American charge d'affaires at Bangkok, reported to the state department today that the army and navy had revolted in Siam. Potter's message said the revolt broke out this morning and took the country by surprise.

The actual leaders of the revolt were not known. Potter said it was rumored a demand will be made for the establishment of a constitutional monarchy under the present king.

Potter added that circulars were issued stating that martial law was established and that opposition would endanger the royal family.

Economic conditions have been considered serious in Siam for some time. On April 25 a large group of poverty-stricken farmers presented a petition to the government demanding loans. In an effort to balance the budget heavy taxes were imposed on salaries and land which were reported to the state department to have caused much distress.

BERLIN, June 24.—(AP)—Marga von Etzdorf, German woman filer, ethnoped the newspaper Vossische Zeitung from Bangkok, Siam, today saying the army had mutilated and seized the royal family as hostages to insure the success of a revolution.

The royal palace was surrounded by hostile troops and rebellious soldiers and sailors thronged the streets, she said.

Later King Prajadhipok and the other members of the royal family were removed to a warship. Army tanks rumbled through the streets in the hands of the rebels and machine gun squads were frequently to be seen.

Siam in the native tongue is Thai, which means land of the free, but it is an absolute monarchy and King Prajadhipok, who recently visited the United States, is supreme power of the land.

He appoints the ministers and all the other high government officials and he may remove them whenever he sees fit. There is no party government, no parliament, and the king is his own prime minister. Usually, however, he consults on important matters.

King Prajadhipok succeeded to the throne on the death of the present dynasty.

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
