

### SMITH MAY QUIT AS CANDIDATE IF ROOSEVELT WILL

Floor Manager for 'Happy Warrior' Hints at Retirement in Favor of Some Candidate 'Better Fitted'

CHICAGO, June 24.—(AP)—A sudden anti-Roosevelt pronouncement of Mayor Frank Hague of Jersey City today caused Democratic chieftains to wonder whether Hague meant Alfred E. Smith would quit the presidential race if Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt would.

Hague, convention floor manager of Smith and vice-chairman of the Democratic national committee, declared in his statement last night Roosevelt "has no chance of winning" if nominated by the convention, predicted he would not carry "a single state east of the Mississippi" and asserted before the convention were names of several men who were better fitted for the nomination than Roosevelt.

Roosevelt Camp Unruffled  
The Roosevelt camp greeted the declaration without any outward show of concern. Its only answer was this statement of James A. Farley, manager of the New York governor's campaign:

"Governor Roosevelt's friends have not come to Chicago to cry down, or to denigrate any Democrat from any part of the union. This, I believe, is sufficient answer to Mayor Hague's statement."

But elsewhere there was a flood of speculation as to whether Hague meant to imply Smith would readily retire in favor of some candidate should Roosevelt do likewise. The decision of the "friends" of Roosevelt is to declare war on the two-thirds rule.

It is generally known some party leaders would look askance at Smith's renomination by the convention in view of his defeat by President Hoover in the 1928 campaign.

Conference Adds Fuel  
Smith himself conferred with Hague while the latter was drafting the statement and this added fuel to the fire of speculation. As candidates "better fitted" in addition to Smith, Hague named Governor Ritchie of Maryland, Melvin A. Traylor of Chicago, Speaker John N. Garner, Newton D. Baker, Governor White of Ohio, Governor Murray of Oklahoma, former Senator Reed of Missouri, former Governor Byrd of Virginia and Senator Lewis of Illinois.

Asserting it was common knowledge the Republicans were hoping Roosevelt would be nominated, Hague said it was apparent that any man who cannot carry New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut and the other New England states, together with the middle west and a few states in the far west, is not the man for the party leaders to choose in this crisis.

### TURKISH ENVOYS SEE CAPITALISM RULING MOSCOW

Moscow May Get Jolt When Informed Official Angora Paper Calls Russia Of Stalin 'New America.'

ANGORA, Turkey (AP)—Soviet Russia and nationalist Turkey are fast friends, but Moscow may get a jolt when that capital hears that an official Angora spokesman has called the Russia of Stalin "the new America."

This opinion of Yunus Nadi Bey, deputy and journalist, is one of several reactions of the Turkish delegation which accompanied Premier Ismet Pasha on his recent amity-collecting, credit-collecting trip to Moscow.

Sees Capitalistic Soviet.  
Nadi Bey found that bolshevism and communism are little heard of in Russia today. A capitalistic regime more powerful than that of America is what really reigns there, he says. And he declares this state of capitalism which Russia is building up is the goal towards which the new Turkey should steer.

She has been looking thousands of miles away towards the United States for ideas, while here in her close neighbor, says Nadi Bey, she can find "the new American model." A second surprise for Moscow is an article by another influential deputy-journalist, Mahmoud Bey, asserting that the soviet economic and political successes do not reside in the bolshevik regime.

"They reside in the technique which we can study equally well in Rome as in Moscow," he says. "Turkey intends to adopt neither bolshevism nor fascism, but what she must adopt is the discipline and the will-to-work which exist equally in the two countries where those two regimes exist."

Takes Moscow To Task  
While admitting that as a result of the recent trip "we know and love the Russians better than ever," Mahmoud Bey calls Moscow's attention rather sharply to "two painful facts." First, he says, "Turkey's trade with Russia is not as satisfactory as we had wished—it is at present unfavorable to Turkey."

Next he avers that "a certain amount of communist propaganda is being carried on in nationalist Turkey whose government is entirely opposed to any expression of communism within its borders." The deputy begs Moscow to remove these two impediments to perfect friendship.

### ROOSEVELT FOES BATTLE TO KEEP TWO-THIRDS RULE

hall, let it be known he would fight "to the last ditch" against abrogation of the rule.

Word also came from Tammany headquarters that Curry was slated for the post of national committee-man now occupied by Norman E. Mack, a Roosevelt supporter.

Opposition also was voiced by former Senator James A. Reed of Missouri.

Good Enough for Jackson.  
"The rule was good enough for Andrew Jackson and it should be good enough for 1932," he said.

Farley announced that J. Bruce Kremer, of Montana, the choice of the Roosevelt forces for chairman of the rules committee, will lead the fight against the rule.

Farley was asked if he had "counted noses" of the delegates on the proposed change, and replied:

"We wouldn't have made the move unless we had been sure of our ground."

He said he was satisfied the southern delegates are coming here like the rest of the Roosevelt people, determined to nominate the governor and not let this determined opposition stop them.

"We do not consider this move a sign of weakness but of course our

rivals will say that it is," he said. Commenting on Joust Shouse's statement that it would be unfair to abrogate the two-thirds rule and leave the unit rule in effect, Farley said:

Unit Rule Untouched.  
"This convention has nothing to do with the unit rule; that's up to the states themselves."

Farley said the Roosevelt forces would "let the governor make suggestions himself as to his running mate."

"I can say definitely that his mind is entirely open on the subject now," he added.

From Representative Rayburn of Texas, leader of the Garner forces, came the assertion the Roosevelt forces admitted they cannot win under the two-thirds rule when they assailed the ancient constitution law.

He charged Farley was seeking to throw "national considerations to the four winds," by seeking to change the rule in a "ruthless hope of a majority."

Rayburn's statement added that if Farley wanted Governor Roosevelt to command the respect of the Democratic party and of the nation he "cannot seriously mean he will undertake to change the rule."

Change Now Unfair.  
"Americans have been bred to believe it unfair to change the rules in the middle of the game," Rayburn said.

Rayburn conferred with State Senator Walter Woolul of Texas and William G. McAdoo, head of the Call-

ifornia delegation supporting Speaker Garner.

He said he doubted very much whether Speaker Garner would come to the convention.

A number of senators were added today to the host of Democratic leaders on the scene.

They included Harrison of Mississippi, Byrnes of South Carolina, Bailey of North Carolina and Bulky of Ohio.
