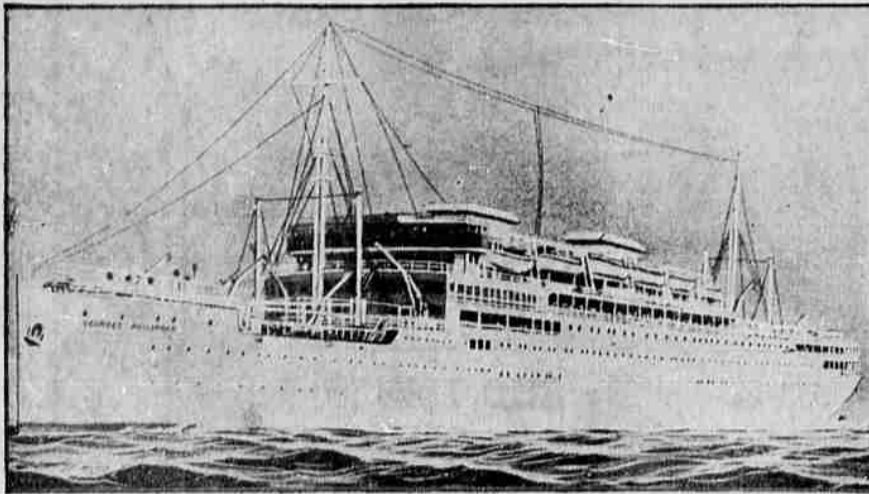


FIRE DESTROYS FRENCH MOTORSHIP; 100 MISSING

OPERA INVADERS THE KITCHEN



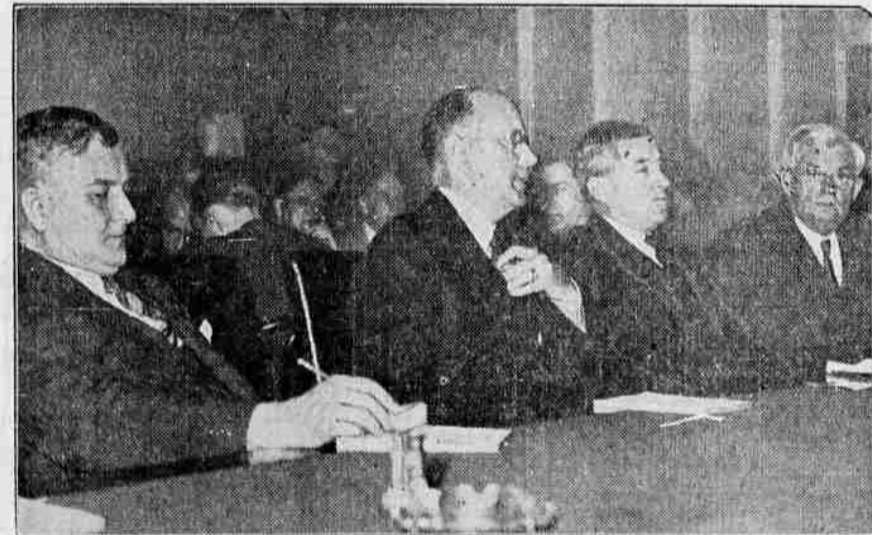

IN OHIO'S MINE STRIKE ZONE



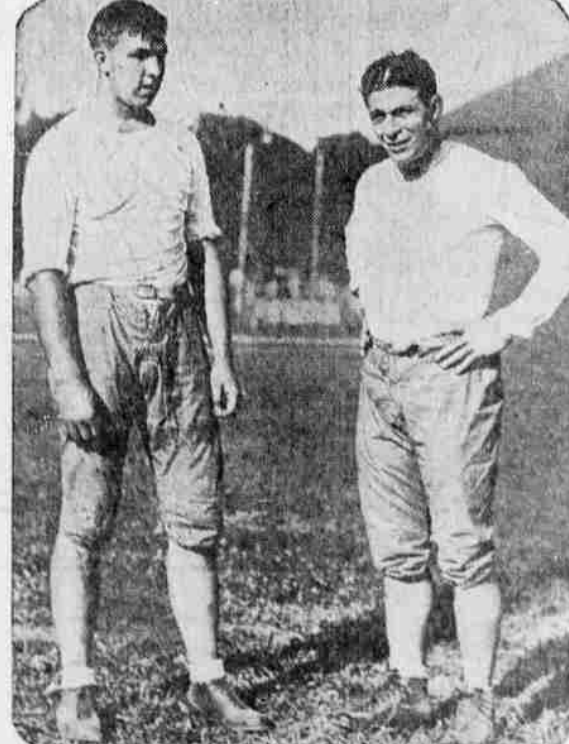
