NORTON EXPECTED HOME TOMORROW

Circuit Judge H. D. Norton is expected to return tomorrow from Oregon City, where he has been occupying the Clatskanie county bench. He will hear motions, and other pending matters Friday, according to present plans.

Among matters scheduled to be heard within the next week is the plea of F. A. Bates, aged Gold Hill miner, indicted by the last grand jury, for alleged threats to commit a felony. Bates was granted 10 days recently in which to plead, and the time expires next week. Bates, in the afternoon of the last primary, gained considerable local publicity. His controversy with the law and neighbors was painted as "a miscarriage of justice."

Bates returned from Washington state, where he was living with kin, to answer to the indictment. He is at liberty on a small bond, furnished by his daughter, and L. A. Banks, orchardist.

COUNTY COURT MEET DELAYED TO FRIDAY

There was no session of the county court today, it being postponed until Friday next, when necessary bills and matters will be signed. The postponement was due to the pressure of private business matters of members of the court. No pressing matters were scheduled for attention today. County Judge Lamkin was attending to private matters in Ashland, and expected to spend a couple of hours at his office. He was scheduled to unite in marriage a northern California couple, who sent word they would embark upon the sea of matrimony.

SANITY HEARING FOR STARVATION WOMAN PLANNED

A hearing into the sanity of the woman held in the woman's ward of the county jail is scheduled for today, before County Judge C. B. Lamkin, as a result of statements made yesterday afternoon to Deputy Sheriff O. W. (Ike) Dunford and Miss Lillian Roberts, Red Cross worker.

According to Deputy Dunford the woman admitted that her true name is Eula Phillips; that she has a sister residing at Tillamook, Ore., and her mother lives at Swain, Arkansas. The woman was detained by Klamath county authorities, and gave the name of Mrs. Rena Johnson. She was found on a highway near Klamath Falls last week in a famished and delirious condition, with her nine-year-old daughter. She reported that she had been forced to leave her home by her husband, and then abandoned by him. She told the authorities that her husband was dead, but she had been touring with his brother. The woman and child fled from the Klamath county farm last Saturday, and were picked up by local authorities Sunday.

According to the sheriff's office, the woman admitted the use of several aliases, and a long string of petty thefts, chiefly stealing milk bottles from porches, and articles from stores. She alleges that her male companion was the instigator of the thefts. The officers further allege that the woman sought arrest to find food and refuge in jail.

Jailor Dunford reports that last night the woman became unmanageable in the women's ward, pounding the walls and windows with her fists. The nine-year-old daughter, a bright little girl, will probably be placed in the care of kin.

REED GRANTED NEW EXTENSION

Sixty days further extension of time for the preparation of testimony and perfection of appeal to the supreme court has been granted to Albert W. Reed, Denver, Colo., youth serving life in state prison for conviction of the murder of Victor Knott, Ashland policeman last November. The extension will also enable Reed further time for the securing of funds to finance his appeal, his friends and relatives being unable, to date, to raise the \$255 needed. Attorney Gus Newbury, his chief counsel, said he was willing to contribute \$100 of this sum. Reed's appeal is based upon new evidence, supporting his trial contention that he was not at the scene of the shooting, that the murder was committed by his two pals—Paul McQuade and Lee Jackson—fugitives from a Jackson county murder indictment for first degree murder, and alleged discrepancies in the testimony of Policeman Roy Layton of Ashland, star witness for the state.

ASHLAND YOUNG SWIMMING NUDE, SAYS POLICEMAN

Substantiation of the article appearing in The Mail-Tribune yesterday stating that a group of Ashland boys and girls were holding nude bathing parties in the waters of Emigrant Dam, was made this morning by State Policeman Joseph Folsom.

State Policeman Folsom states that mixed nude bathing parties have been going on for some time at the upper end of Emigrant Dam, nearly a mile from the Pacific Highway. Folsom says that the asserted nudists post a lookout on top of an auto, who sounds an alarm when anyone approaches. He states that Sunday evenings are the most popular date. A persistent effort has been made to stop the practice, he says.

It is further set forth that the nude swimming has nothing to do with the arrest of Ashland boys and girls yesterday, alleged to have stolen a chicken, and attempting to cook it on the banks of Bear Creek. The state policeman states that all concerned in this prank were conventionally garbed. An Ashland girl on parole, was detained.

The Ashland Tidings yesterday, with Chief of Police Clus as an authority published an article, with a sub-head reading: "Alleged Nude Swimmers Said to Have Also Stolen Chicken."

The article further says: "According to officers they have received numerous reports of nude swimming parties at the Emigrant creek reservoir."

Considerable local journalistic horror has been betrayed at the publicity attendant upon the discovery of juvenile nudity while swimming."
