

# Byrne, McCarthy Meet in Main Event on Armory Card Tonight

## WINNER PROMISED SHOT AT LOMSKI IN NEAR FUTURE

### Entire Card Pits Boys Full of Battle—Two Six-Round Bouts Carry Heavy Interest of Partisan Fans

Promoter Mack Lillard has scheduled 26 rounds of hot and heavy boxing at the Armory tonight, but neither he nor those who have watched the mitt-slingers train, expects to see any of the four bouts go the full route.

In the main event Jimmy Byrne, Marshallfield heavy who packs a sleeping punch, will tangle with Jack McCarthy, highly touted San Francisco ringster, in 19 rounds. The men are both exponents of the slugging school of battling, willing to take a punch to land one and both say they expect to end tonight's brawl as soon as possible. With a promised shot at Leo Lomski in the near future as the prize, a hectic battle is guaranteed.

Supporting card will pit a pair of Medford favorites against rugged boys in a pair of six-round double semi-final bouts. Circus Red Howe, Coos Bay battler meets Jack Hayes, Portland warrior of long experience and high repute and Terry Killen, Medford and Salem prize, swapping hooks and jabs with Ray Littman, Grants Pass lad who is fast coming to the fore.

A four-round curtain raiser, calculated to whet the cash customers' appetite for action will see Art Matthews, who bears considerable local reputation as a fighter, and Herb White of Butte Falls, also known as being handy with his "dikes."

Those who witnessed Lillard's last show came away boosting for the new promoter. His long experience in the racket enables him to match boys who will provide interesting bouts. He insists on his fighters doing just that and has no use for the "high divers" and waltzers.

Tonight's show will open at 8:30.

## PYTHIAN PUTTER DEFEATS TUMY IN CLOSE ENCOUNTER

Thanks to his magic putter, Geo. Pythian, noosed out Earl Tummy on Monday afternoon, to reach the semi-finals in the Medford golf club tournament. It was one of the closest matches of the present tournament and developed some high class golf. As the turn Tummy who had had trouble with his putter from the start, was two down, but squared the match when he took a birdie on the 10th and a par on the 11th. Pythian however refused to be headed and sinking one putt on the next two holes was again two up when the 15th tee was reached. Here Tummy tightened, won the 16th and halved the 17th, driving for the final hole, one down. His drive was a beauty, but his second shot was to the left of the green in the rough. He chipped out with deadly accuracy, and sunk his putt for a par 4. Pythian however, never faltered and in spite of his wildness got a 5 which with his stroke halved the hole and gave him the match. Some idea of the brand of golf played and the closeness of the match, may be gained by the fact that while Tummy shot a 37 on the second nine, he won only one hole, even tho his opponent had an advantage of only 2 strokes.

## ONE RUN LOSSES HOLDING REDS IN EIGHTH POSITION

Probably the most cogent commentary on the tense character of the National league race lies in the fact that the Cincinnati Reds, with the best defensive record of any team in the circuit, cannot get out of eighth place to save their lives. The secret of Cincinnati's misfortune lies in its inability to win the close ones. Eighteen times the Reds have been beaten by a single run, most of them well pitched, tightly fought affairs. In other words, if they had gotten perhaps a dozen hits scattered out where they needed them most, they could very well have been in first place today instead of eighth.

No explanation is necessary of the Reds' latest loss. They ran into Bill Hallahan yesterday when the southpaw felt like pitching himself a ball game. They got only four hits and the score was St. Louis 6, Cincinnati 2.

Young Bobby Brown turned in another fine game as the Boston Braves defeated the Phillies, 5 to 2.

New York and Brooklyn divided a pair, the Giants winning the first, 7 to 3 and the Dodgers the second, 5 to 3.

The Yankees demonstrated why they are kingly of the American league in triumphing Washington, 5 to 2. They made only four hits off Al Thomas, but two of them were home runs by Lazzeri and Sewell and another was a single by Earle Combs with the bases laden.

The 19-year-old Lewis Krause made his first start of the season for the Athletics and granted seven hits in beating Boston, 5 to 4.

## SPEED BOAT PILOT VISIONS REGATTAS AT FAIR GROUNDS

It would probably sound like idle talk to most persons if we were to state that within a few years many of our state and county fairs would be the scene of hotly contested speed-boat races right in front of the grand stand.

Surely, a dozen trim little speed-boats skimming over the water at 50 miles per hour would be more interesting to view than a few ancient race horses kicking up dust and grime for the spectators to breathe.

The United States has at present one artificial motor boat race course, which is located in the desert lands near Houston, Texas. It is built from an abandoned horse racetrack, one-half mile oval, water five feet in depth and the "track" is about 200 feet wide. This forms a perfect course for hydroplane and speedboat racing such as the Medford enthusiasts vision.

Medford is near an ideal and valuable location where it could economically construct just such an enterprise and playground for their lovers of this clean and thrilling sport. The county fair grounds is a "natural," the water is piped right to the location with a six-inch main; clean, pure water to fill the race course and drained at intervals during the summer months doubling its purpose by flushing Bear creek.

While attending race meets in various cities in Oregon and California, the writer is frequently asked the question, "Why is Medford so well represented at every race meet in the country; they have no lakes or rivers close by; why all the race boats?" The question is hard to answer, except that "It's a Great Country," with a lot of wide-awake, red-blooded people.

It is believed that with motor-boat racing at the Jackson county fair this fall, the fair would not only be a huge success but would be the first and only one of its kind in the world, attracting movie news reels

and creating widespread interest throughout the country in Medford's speedboat racing at the county fair "horse track."

During the summer months the fair grounds could be made the center of attraction with boat races held frequently. Concessions, boat houses, etc., rented to the fast growing number of boating enthusiasts would shortly pay for the building of such a project.

An outboard motor representative who recently visited Medford while on a tour of the state quoted from statistics gathered by a large motor manufacturer in the east, that the

people of Medford, Oregon, own more motor boats in comparison to its distance from water than any other city in the United States.
