Speaker for today's luncheon program was Lion E. R. White, who emphasized the demand in the United States today for people who are as willing to meet a peace time crisis as a war-time measure. He quoted recent messages of General Pershing in stressing the call for preparedness in peace, as well as war. He advocated active operation of the Central Civic council in Medford, which has apparently been dormant for almost a year.

"This group should start working now," he stated, "on a program to meet the economic problems which will undoubtedly be up for solution during the coming winter. As long as there is clothing and food available, we should not permit people to go cold and hungry. Some plan for getting the food and clothing to them must be devised by thinking people before it is too late," he concluded. The meeting closed with a rising vote of appreciation of the work carried on during the past year by the outgoing club officers.
