In the semi-final, Circus Red Howe of Marshfield won the decision over Jack Hayes of Portland. Hayes, a sad-faced colored gent, had the most scientific, but Red had the heavier artillery. Hayes stayed the limit thru experience.

Terry Kileen of Medford defeated Ray Litman of Grants Pass. Litman's nose bled throughout most of the fracas, and he lacked a punch. He took a lot of punishment but weathered the storm.

In the curtain raiser Herb White of Butte Falls defeated Art Matthews of this city. Matthews started to wilt at the start of the second round, and thereafter was floored often by his own efforts, and the referee shoved him away once with too much vigor, and down he went again. The bell saved him at least twice.

Byrne, main event winner will be offered a bout with Leo Lomski, here, in the near future. Promoter Mack Lillard will stage the next bill out-of-doors at the fairgrounds.

THURSTON PROVES FIND FOR DODGERS IN GREAT HURLING

Max Carey, manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers, did his best bit of master minding of the season when he decided a month ago to give Hollis Thurston a break.

Up to then, Thurston had been doing relief pitching now and then with indifferent success.

On May 28, Carey sent the 32-year-old right hander against the Giants. Thurston went the route and won, 6 to 4. Since then, Thurston has gone to the hill five times, and yesterday he marked up his sixth straight victory. His success since he was promoted to the variety is one of the big reasons why the Dodgers are in a tie for fourth place in the National League today, only three games from the top.

Yesterday's 7 to 0 win over the Phillies was Thurston's second shut-out in a row and ran his record of consecutive scoreless innings to 22. Hack Wilson's 15th home run with two on featured the Brooklyn assault.

Although they rallied to score four runs in the last of the ninth, the Cincinnati Reds dropped another one-run decision to St. Louis, 10 to 9.

Lefty Gomez, seeking his 12th straight victory, was knocked from the hill in the eighth, but the high-flying Yankees defeated Washington, 6 to 5.

Detroit tightened its hold on second place by thumping Cleveland, 13 to 4, behind Earl Whitehill's tight pitching.

Irving Hadley allowed only four hits in pitching the St. Louis Browns to a 6 to 1 win over Chicago.

When play started yesterday, Portland and Hollywood were in a tie for first place.

Vinny Bolon southpaw, pitched fine ball for Sacramento's 5 to 2 victory over the Stars. Although he gave up 10 hits, the Stars scored but once in the first inning and once in the ninth.

John "Junk" Walters, Seattle pitcher, who can't forget the Seals once gave him the gate, took a leading part in the 4 to 3 victory of the Indians over San Francisco last night. He allowed only six hits, and in the third inning, with one man on base, knocked a home run.

The last-place Missions kept up their winning streak by taking their fourth straight game, defeating Oakland, 2 to 1.

MYERS PINS LUX IN PORTLAND GO

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—(AP)—Bob Myers, former national amateur middleweight wrestler, in his first appearance here in two years, made short work of Eli Lux, of Wisconsin last night. Lux pulled a surprise on Myers in taking the first fall, tossing him with a flying winglock in one minute, 58 seconds. Myers then got under way, taking the second fall in 13 minutes, 25 seconds with a body slam and the third in 9 minutes, 15 seconds, with a reverse headlock.

Bob Kruse defeated Rudy Skarda, substituting for Rudy Laditz, taking two falls with wristlocks.

Glen Stone and Pat Reagan went three rounds to a draw without a fall.

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VINES AND HELEN IN FINAL ROUNDS

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 30.—(AP)—Eliot Vines, American champion, paraded into the final round of the Wimbledon men's singles championship today, with a straight set victory over Jack Crawford, star of the Australian Davis cup team, 6-2, 6-1, 6-3.

Playing in a drizzle on a wet court with Queen Mary and Prince George in the gallery of 14,000, the slim Californian capped the climax of the day that saw Helen Wills Moody smother Mary Heeley, English girl, in the last of the women's singles semifinals to join her fellow townsman from Berkeley, Helen Jacobs, in the final round.

Nevada's number one fight fan, Governor Fred B. Balzar, joined the rush of spectators into the ring and had one leg over the ropes as the near riot was brought to a halt.

Lee, 196 pounds, had put up a courageous and vicious battle, but was out-matched in six of the ten rounds. He is a Levinsky sparring mate.
