QUARTERLY PAY FOR AUTO TAGS STARTS JULY 15

SALEM, June 30.—(AP)—A quarterly system payment of automobile licenses has been worked out by the department of state and will be put into effect on July 15. Hal E. Hosa, secretary of state, announced at Portland last night. Hosa believed such a plan would be legal as it would take the form of receipts on plates.

Governor Julius L. Meier the day before declared a 15-day moratorium on new licenses, and urged some form of quarterly payments in order to relieve the situation relative to purchase of 1933 licenses. Hosa had asked the attorney-general for an opinion on the legality of some procedure for installment buying, which opinion is expected here today. It was stated unofficially that acceptance of a part-payment by the secretary of state's office on a license plate was in reality a deposit on a license and not the issuance of a license and hence might be declared legal.

ASKS \$1767 FOR ACCIDENT AT NAT

Suit for \$1767 alleged damages was filed in the circuit court late yesterday by Marguerite Boyle, 14 against Mrs. Stella J. Merrick, of the "Merrick Motor Inn." The plaintiff takes legal action through her father, as ad litem guardian, John C. Boyle, vice-president of the California-Oregon Power Co. The complaint alleges that in August, 1931, the plaintiff, with other children, was playing with a water ball in the swimming pool. The ball was thrown out of the water, and the children, in the zest of play, rushed out of the water to regain it. It is asserted that the plaintiff, in climbing out of the pool, slipped on the cement curbing, causing her to fall, and sustain permanent injury to her teeth. Fifteen hundred dollars general damages and \$267 for dental services are sought.
