

PIRATE RECRUIT PITCHER HOLDING OUTFIT IN LEAD

Bill Swift Credited With Three of Seven Straight Wins — Phils Move to Fourth Place in One Jump

Today was the fifth straight for the Pittsburgh Pirates at the top of the National league race, and that comes close to being a record for sustained leadership of President John Heydler's effervescent circuit this summer.

Bill Swift, the rookie righthander, deserves a special pointing-out for the part he has played in the Pirates' present streak. Of their seven straight conquests, the lead from Kansas City has received credit for three as a relief pitcher. He rescued Heinie Meire in the fifth inning of yesterday's game with the Cardinals, yielded only four hits and one run the rest of the way, and his mates came from behind to win for him, 9 to 6. Pie Traynor cracked four singles for the leaders.

Cubs Hold Second Place.
The Chicago Cubs held tight in second place by subduing the puncheon Cincinnatians, 7 to 0. While his mates were pounding Red Lucas for 12 hits and 28 bases, Guy Bush managed to keep eight Red bloopers well scattered. Charlie Grimm had a homer and two doubles.

Defeating Brooklyn, 9 to 3, the Phillies jumped from sixth place in the league standing to fourth, passing both the Dodgers and the Cards. Chuck Klein and Hal Lee each belted two home runs, the 23rd and 24th of the year for Klein.

Bill Terry's 19th homer with one of his operatives on base touched off a six-run rally in the fourth inning that routed Lefty Brandt and gave the Giants a 9 to 5 triumph in their opener with the Boston Braves.

Yanks Increase Lead.
The Yankees found Boston easy pickings and increased their lead over the American league to nine and a half games as the second place Detroiters lost. Danny MacFaydan, pitching against his old mates for the first time, received great batting support to win, 15 to 4.

Joe Mauer was entirely too much for Detroit. The Cleveland ace held the Tigers to eight hits and knocked across three runs to give the Indians a 7 to 4 victory. Webb and Gehring each hit a home run for Detroit. It was Ferrell's 14th win of the year.

The St. Louis Browns, though resting in sixth place, climbed well over the 500 mark in games won by defeating Chicago, 7 to 6. The Browns jumped on Vic Prasler for five runs in the first inning and the White Sox made all of theirs when they knocked Blasholder loose in the fourth.

Philadelphia and Washington were idle.

HELEN CAPTURES WIMBLEDON CUP FOR FIFTH TIME

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 1.—(AP)—Mrs. Helen Wills Moody today won the Wimbledon tennis championship for the fifth time, defeating Helen Jacobs, fellow Californian, in the final match, 6-3, 6-1.

Mrs. Moody won the Wimbledon title first in 1927 as Helen Wills and repeated the next three years. She did not go abroad last year and the title fell to Cilly Aussem, of Germany, who did not compete this year.

The American champion's victory repeated the result of the last meeting between the two American women, Mrs. Moody winning last summer, in the finals of the Sasbricht, N. J., tourney, 6-0, 6-0.

The two Helens also were finalists at Wimbledon three years ago with Mrs. Moody winning then with the loss of only three games.

Winner Allison and John Van Ryn, Wimbledon doubles champion in 1929 and 1930 and present American Davis cup pair, were defeated in the semi-finals by the veteran French combination of Jacques Brugnon and Jean Borotra, 6-3, 6-2, 6-4.
