

C. C. WILL SEEK 60-DAY LEEWAY AS AUTOIST AID

Decisive action by the board of directors of the local Chamber of Commerce regarding the extension of time allowed for the purchase of motor vehicle licenses was taken today at the meeting of the directorate, when it was decided to ask the state board of control to grant a sixty-day moratorium on licenses, for the purpose of meeting conditions which are particularly prevalent in Jackson county.

The chamber directors also adopted the recommendations of the tax committee, recommending endorsement of the proposed constitutional amendment and the tax supervising and conservation bill. The committee's report had been submitted to the board in writing previous to the meeting, and all present had been given ample time for consideration of the measures. It was the prevailing opinion that these new laws offer the necessary machinery for effecting real reductions in property taxes, a project in which the local chamber has been deeply interested for the past two years.

Other business transacted at today's meeting included reports of the publicity and fish and game committees, both of which were adopted; and a brief discussion of the plan of unemployment relief presented to the people of the city some ten days ago. No particular action was taken on the unemployment problem, but the matter will be under active consideration by the chamber from now on, was the opinion expressed by W. S. Bolger, president of the chamber.

DISCLAIM W. C. T. U. THIRD PARTY AIM FOR PROHIBITION CAUSE

EVANSTON, Ill., July 1.—(AP)—The National Women's Christian Temperance Union disclaimed today any part in a third party "dry" movement at this time.

If W. C. T. U. members attend a purported third party convention of drys at Indianapolis July 4 they will be present as individuals, not as representatives of the W. C. T. U., said Mrs. Ella A. Boole, president of the national W. C. T. U.

"The women of the W. C. T. U. will decide for themselves as to what political action they will take," said Mrs. Boole, "and this will be done at our national convention in Seattle August 12-19."

"These two conventions have been politicians' conventions. Now will come the action of the home loving women, millions of whom abhor the attempt to restore the liquor traffic. The attempt to make it appear that women want repeal of prohibition is ridiculous. The party opening the door to liquor is doomed."

HARD WINTER FOR JOBLESS COMING

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1.—(AP)—Reports indicating the number of unemployed next winter probably will be 20 per cent above the peak number of last year were received here yesterday by the state executive relief committee. Seasonal employment, reports said, have not offset the growing number of unemployed.

The committee has begun a study of information already gathered and general recommendations for organization of relief measures will be given as soon as possible.

The committee requested county relief councils to begin at once to plan for an organized relief program for gathering and preserving surplus supplies for distribution next winter. Some counties, the committee said, already have begun organization.

STOP ROOSEVELT EFFORT KEEPING FOES FROM REST

CHICAGO, July 1.—(AP)—The fault lines set by eight contenders for the presidential nomination, strained mightily today to hold Franklin D. Roosevelt back from the Democratic convention's two-thirds majority.

Eyes reddened from the sleepless hours that drove the heat-harassed convention through the night to a three-ballot deadlock at daylight, leaders of the contending factions set about bolstering their lines against the Roosevelt attack. A joint caucus was called of the Texas and California delegations whose 90 votes are pledged to Speaker Garner. So close did Roosevelt come to the 770 needed votes on the last ballot this morning that this one block of votes would put him across, but there was indication the Garner leaders were not ready to swing their strength to the New York governor.

COOLING SYSTEM REPAIRED RIALTO
