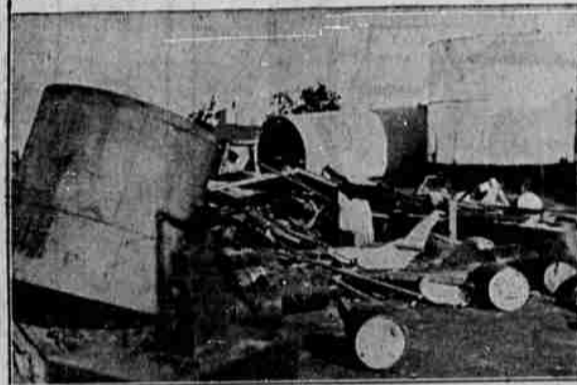


IOWA GIRL WINS SPELLING BEE

READY FOR CONFEDERATE REUNION



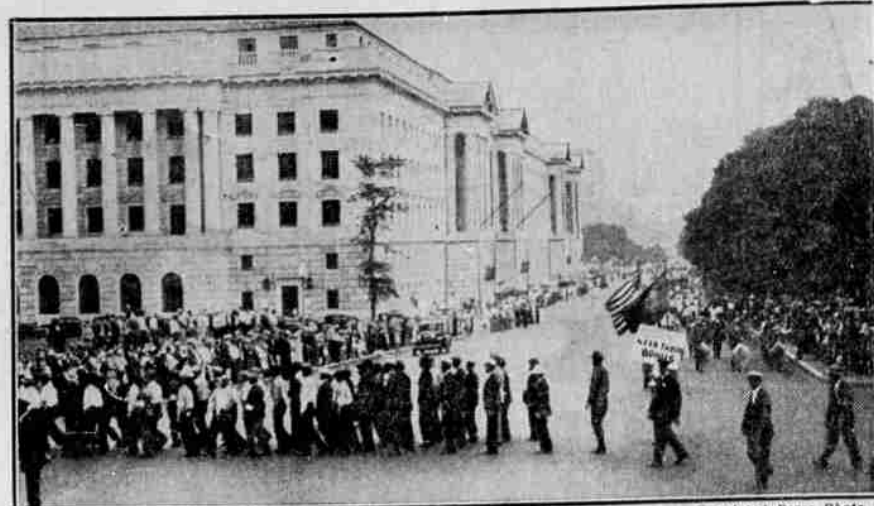

WILLIAMS TRAINS FOR OLYMPICS



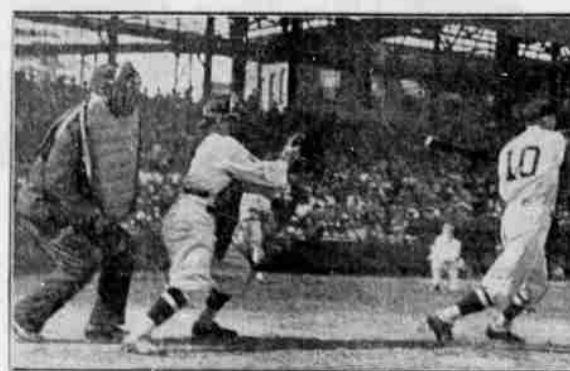
