REV. H. W. WALLACE RETIRED MINISTER DIES AT RIPE AGE

Rev. Horace Howard Wallace, 62, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Wm. F. Campbell, 804 E. Main St., July 1.

Rev. Wallace was born in Columbus, Coos county, New Hampshire, May 10, 1840, son of Orpheus and Fanny Bradley Wallace, natives of New Hampshire, who moved to Minnesota in 1858, and pre-empted land near Spring Valley.

Rev. Wallace was educated in Beloit Academy, Beloit, Wis., and the public schools of Illinois and Minnesota.

After this, he again went south, and saw service in many engagements, among which were the siege of Vicksburg, battle of Little Rock, Fitzhugh's Woods, where April 1, 1864, he was wounded in the right shoulder, causing him to spend seven months in hospitals.

They moved to Spring Valley in 1880, where he studied four years for the ministry, being ordained and preaching for 21 years in both northern and southern conferences of the Methodist Episcopal church.
