REV. H. W. WALLACE RETIRED MINISTER DIES AT RIPE AGE

Rev. Horace Howard Wallace, 62, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Wm. F. Campbell, 804 E. Main St., July 1.

Rev. Wallace was born in Columbus, Coos county, New Hampshire, May 10, 1840, son of Orpheus and Fanny Bradley Wallace, natives of New Hampshire, who moved to Minnesota in 1858, and pre-empted land near Spring Valley.

Rev. Wallace was educated in Beloit Academy, Beloit, Wis., and the public schools of Illinois and Minnesota.

Oct. 11, 1861, he enlisted in Co. C, Third Minnesota Volunteer Regiment and went south. The following year he went north to assist in quelling the Indians in the Minnesota massacres.

After this, he again went south, and saw service in many engagements, among which were the siege of Vicksburg, battle of Little Rock, Fitzhugh's Woods, where April 1, 1864, he was wounded in the right shoulder, causing him to spend seven months in hospitals.

Nov. 14, 1864, he was honorably discharged after which he resumed his former occupation of farming.

On Jan. 1, 1866, he was married to Louise Prosser and to this union were born three children, Herbert, who died in infancy, Bert, and Frances.

They moved to Spring Valley in 1880, where he studied four years for the ministry, being ordained and preaching for 21 years in both northern and southern conferences of the Methodist Episcopal church.

In 1902 he retired and lived in Spring Valley until 1919 when he went to live with his daughter at Duquesne, Penn. In 1924 they came west with their daughter, Mrs. W. F. Campbell and have lived in Medford since.

He leaves his daughter, Frances W. Campbell, and his son, Bert A.

Wallace of Columbus, Ohio. He also leaves one brother, Albert H. Wallace, of Orting, Wash.

Rev. Wallace was a remarkable man in advanced age. He retained all his faculties until three weeks ago. He repeated the 23rd Psalm to his daughter several days ago, and had written poetry at different times, which he loved to repeat to his friends.
