VETO BY HOOVER AWAITING RELIEF BILL ON MONDAY

PREPARE PLANTS FOR FRUIT CROP

Pre-packing and fruit shipping activity will be in full swing in the orchards and packing houses of the valley the coming week in preparation for the fruit season, scheduled to start about August 10. Ideal weather conditions prevail for fruit of all kinds.

Packing plants of the city and valley are now in the midst of seasonal repairs to machinery and buildings. Boxmakers are getting underway and their work will include replacement of hundreds of lug boxes destroyed in the fire that swept the packing district last April.

Orchardists and packers have announced that they will hire local help as far as possible in order to help relieve the local unemployment situation. Experienced packers have been asked to register with the packing houses for work. Many local orchardists will not hire workers unless they are able to show a local labor card, setting forth eligibility and bona fide residence.

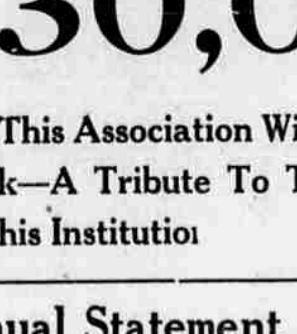
