

# OAT LICE INFEST EYES, EARS, HAIR OF ILLINOIS FOLK

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 11. — (AP) — Insects heretofore satisfied with life on the farm are starting a new farm to city movement.

The oat louse, for example. Lots of city folks are taking more than they would like, observed A. J. Surratt, federal agricultural statistician, today.

Surratt called 1932 the most prolific bug year in a decade, and warned the residents of Illinois cities that the little pests have spread from country road to city street to infest the eyes, ears, head and clothing of the townspeople.

One Mattoon resident said he drove through a cloud of oat lice so thick they covered his windshield and he had to stop and brush them off.

Oat lice do no particular damage to crops, Surratt said, but they are only one pest enjoying a boom year. Chinch bugs andessian fly, nemesis of small grains and corn, are also flourishing.
