

INDIANS INJECT LIFE IN LEAGUE PENNANT CHASE

Boisterous Batting Attacks Win Nine of Last 12 Starts—Grove Victim in Yesterday's Bat Foray

The Cleveland Indians, tearing through the east with a speed and spirit that stamps them a vastly improved club in the last month, promise to install some life in an American league race that had about died on its feet.

Featuring a boisterous batting attack, the Indians have captured nine of their last twelve games, and within a week have fought their way up from the second division into a tie for third place. Another victory over the A's today would plant them in a tie for the second rung.

Great Grove Victim
The Indians gave one of their most impressive performances of the year yesterday in hammering the great Lefty Grove for 18 hits and a 7-to-6 victory.

The combination of Charley Ruffing's glib-edged pitching and Ben Chapman's home run with one aboard gave the Yanks a 4-to-2 decision over St. Louis, although they made only five hits off Walter Stewart.

It took Washington 10 innings to subdue the White Sox, 13 to 12, and then they needed a wild throw by Luke Appling to give them the deciding run.

The Boston Red Sox nosed out Detroit, 3 to 2, behind Bob Killee. Successive drives by Dave Barbee and Gus Dugue gave the Pittsburgh Pirates an 8-to-7 verdict over Brooklyn in 12 innings.

Cubs Hold Pace
The second place Chicago Cubs kept pace with a 4-to-3 win over the Braves, engineered by Pat Malone. Knocked from the box in the first inning the previous day, Malone came back to allow eight hits and score the winning run in the ninth.

George Watkins gave the Cardinals their third straight over the Phillies by a score of 7 to 6 when he knocked one from the premises after two were out and one on in the ninth inning.

Thanks to an error by Joe Morrissey in the last inning, the Giants broke a four-game losing streak with a 4-to-3 win over the Cincinnati Reds.

'POISON BROTHERS' OUT ON INJURIES

PITTSBURGH, July 13.—(AP)—The jinx that has trailed many a major league ball club has caught up with the league leading Pittsburgh Pirates to put the "poison brothers," Lloyd and Paul Waner on the sidelines.

During yesterday's extra inning game with Brooklyn, Lloyd suffered a wrenched leg that will keep him out of the game for several days. Paul, the National league's leading slugger, cut a finger and while he may play today, he has a very sore hand.

Baseball men agreed that the loss of the younger Waner for any considerable length of time will hurt the Pirates' chances for the league flag. He is one of the most consistent hitters in the lineup.

REED AND JONES MATCHED AGAIN

SALEM, Ore., July 13.—(AP)—Robin Reed of Reedsport, holder of the world welterweight wrestling championship, will defend it against Henry Jones of Provo, Utah, here again next Tuesday night, it was announced in the course of a mat show at the armory in which both men defeated their opponents.

On the night of July 4 Reed retained his belt when he and Jones wrestled a two-hour draw.

Reed, 148 pounds, took two out of three falls from Pat Finnegan, 147, of Springfield, Ohio, and Jones, 146, defeated Jack Salisbury, 146, of Salt Lake City in similar fashion.

SEVEN-RUN RALLY BY OAKS IN NINTH DEFEATS BEAVERS

The Oakland A's, running seventh in a field of eight, treated hometown fans to their best ball game of the season in upsetting the league leading Portland club, 7 to 6. The defeat did not cost the Beavers their top position, for Hollywood, second by only one game, also was tipped over by Los Angeles, 6 to 5.

The Beavers had the Oaks blanked for eight innings, but in the ninth the Oaks trooped in with seven runs.

Hollywood had a four-run lead in the first inning, but the Angels came back with one in the second and five in the third to win, 6 to 5.

Curt Davis of the Seals and Ted Pilette of the Missions engaged in a pitching tussle, the Seals winning, 3 to 2. Davis shut out the Missions until the ninth when they scored their two runs on a walk, a single, an error and an outfield fly.

Seattle's drive to advance from the second division in the standing to fourth place was checked by the Sacramento Senators, who beat the Indians, 9 to 2. The Sacs got 12 hits.

EX-MEDFORD GRID STARS FACE SIXTH YEAR UNDER PRINK

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 13.—(Special)—It is not often that a football player spends six years under the same coach in high school and college.

That is what will happen to three Oregon stars—Bill Morgan, captain-elect; Bill Bowerman, first-string quarterback; and Bernie Hughes, first string guard. All three played under Callison for four years when he was high school coach at Medford. These lads were on the high school teams that swept through four state championships.

In 1929, when Callison came to Oregon as freshman coach under Captain John J. McEwan, these lads followed him here. That fall they were all mainstays of Prink's yearling eleven.

The following year Morgan and Bowerman graduated into the varsity under Dr. C. W. Spears, now coach at Wisconsin. Morgan won a regular berth as a tackle, but Bowerman first played end then was moved into the backfield to be blocking quarterback and field general. Hughes was not in school in 1930, so he did not play.

Last year all three played under Spears, and all three were regulars. Morgan was named on several all-east elevens and at the end of the season was chosen captain of the team. Morgan will be a regular tackle this year. Bowerman will be quarterback, while Hughes may be shifted to center, the post he held for four years on the Medford high team and on the freshman eleven here, Callison said, to bolster that department. Eric Forsta, regular pivot man for the last three years, was graduated last June, and Callison is seriously considering giving first call to Hughes.

This will be Bowerman's and Morgan's final season, but not Hughes', who did not play varsity ball in 1930, so Bernie will have an opportunity of playing another year under Callison—in 1933. That would make it seven years under the same coach and undoubtedly would be some kind of a record.

NEXT FIGHT CARD IN ARMORY ARENA

Due to legal technicalities which bar boxing in the state outside the jurisdiction of city boxing commissions, the next card scheduled for Wednesday, July 20, at the Jackson county fairgrounds, will instead be held in the Medford armory, according to Promoter Mack Lillard, Leo Lomaki, the "Aberdeen Assassin," will meet Jack McCarthy, San Francisco corner, in the 10-round main event, which promises to "pack 'em in." McCarthy gave a good account of himself against the heavier Jimmy Byrne, in a recent fight here and fans are anxious to see him in action against a man of his own weight.

One of the bouts carded—that between Bob Christine, Medford, and Wardlow Howell, giant Ashland high school athletic star—is still somewhat in the air as Howell has not been signed.

Other events on the program include Circus Red Howe, local favorite, and Roy Sullivan, Tacoma, in a six-round affair, and Herb White, Butte Falls, and Young Lutman, Grants Pass, at six rounds.

WHEN GENE SMACKS 'EM GOLF BALLS TRAVEL FAST

DETROIT, Mich., July 13.—(AP)—Gene Sarazen hits a golf ball off the tee at a velocity of between 120 and 130 miles an hour. This was established in a test made yesterday with stop watches and an automobile at the proving grounds of a local motor car company.

Synchronizing the start of a drive five times with an automobile maintaining a 120-mile an hour speed, Sarazen got the ball in the lead of the motor car for about 100 yards. Then for a time the ball and car traveled on even terms but finally the car pulled gradually away.

Timers with stop watches were posted along the testing course to clock both ball and car at various stages. Counting only the distance in flight, the ball traveled 230 yards in 4.5 seconds and the automobile covered the same distance in 4.1 seconds.

Sarazen said the test showed it is the speed with which the clubhead hits the ball, as much as the timing of the stroke, that gives distance on drives.

BASEBALL CLUB GOES ON STRIKE

TOPEKA, Kan., July 13.—(AP)—A "no pay, no play" strike has been called by members of the Independence club of the Western association, simultaneously with a disputed announcement that William Fleischer, owner of the Topeka club, had relinquished possession.

The latest developments last night, has left the status of the six-club loop in considerable uncertainty. Financial troubles have been common during the season, resulting in numerous transfers of memberships and teams.

Members of the Independence club, irked at non-payment of back salaries, left Hutchinson last night an hour before game time and forfeited the contest to the wheat-shockers. A futile effort was made by Marty Purcell, producer manager, to prevent the departure of his charges.
