

ASSOCIATED OIL PERSONNEL HEARS SALES PROGRAM

Before hearing about the postponement he ate a "last meal" consisting of steak, mashed potatoes, peas, carrots, apples, pineapples, oranges, bananas, fruit salad, apple pie, ice cream, coffee and milk.

ROOSEVELT YAWL THROUGH CANAL

SANDWICH, Mass., July 15.—(AP)—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt and his cruising companions aboard the yawl Myth II, passed through the Cape Cod canal today at the end of a tow line and emerged on the waters of Massachusetts bay a few minutes after 10 o'clock.

The yacht's course was set for Gloucester, Marblehead or Manchester, some 60 miles up the coast.

The governor and his party were cheered by crowds of Cape Cod residents and summer visitors who gathered on the bridges spanning the canal. The crew of the Sandwich coast guard station gave the governor a hand salute and, in a power surf boat, delivered five telegrams to him.

PROBE OF COPCO RATES WILL TAKE SEVERAL MONTHS

SALEM, Ore., July 15.—(AP)—Investigation of rates and charges of the California Oregon Power company in southern Oregon has been started by the public utilities commission. It was announced today, but the date for the hearing has not yet been set and will probably not be held for several months.

Investigation of the company's business will take considerable time. Probe of the records is concentrated at Medford, headquarters for the firm, but field work will be extended to Klamath Falls and other places where the California Oregon Power company operates. Any change resulting from such findings by engineers and the subsequent hearing will affect all points served by the company.

The utilities commission announced its engineering staff has been concentrated on two main jobs at the present time. Part is investigating power rates, while another part is investigating rates and charges of the telephone companies in the state. Definite date of hearings on both have not yet been announced.

FISHERMEN HAPPY IS RIVER REPORT

There may be better fish in the Rogue than have ever been caught, but some dandies have been landed during the past 10 days, according to Hainbow Gibson, who announces that 10 or 20 steelhead are caught each day in the lower river near Weastku inn.

Growing reports of fishing were also received by the Chamber of Commerce today from George Howard, manager of the Diamond Lake resort. He says that all boats going out on the lake these days return well supplied with fish, all anglers bringing in limit catches.

Yesterday he was breezing along through a tunnel on Roseman hill. A fire burst, poured water into the firebox of his locomotive and the steam blew the firebox door open, scalding Sires and disabling the locomotive.

Racked with pain, Sires stuck to his post and coasted his train fourteen miles into Livingston, where a waiting helper locomotive picked up the train and brought it in into the depot.

The train was only a few minutes late. The aged engineer will recover from his burn.
