NEW DEAL ON GRAIN RATES IS DEMANDED

SEATTLE, July 5.—(AP)—Grain farmers of the Pacific northwest, facing inability to continue production, Roy W. Rittner, of Umatilla county, Oregon, told the I. C. C. grain rate hearing yesterday, are "demanding a new deal on freight rates."

"They are tired of having the deficits from passenger departments and from non-profitable freight service charged against their wheat," he said.

MEDFORD PILOTS WIN MAJOR SHARE K. F. BOAT RACES

In the speedboat races and regatta at Klamath Falls yesterday afternoon at the Oregon Boat company dock, Upper Klamath lake, Medford drivers carried off most of the awards, with "Irish Luck," piloted by Joe Meyer and Harold Grey, winning honors. The races were a part of the program in connection with the Lions club state convention at Klamath Falls.

With Joe Meyer as pilot, the boat came in for the lead in both heats of the class C event, and held the same position in class D, with Harold Grey as pilot. Ernie Millot of Stockton won the free-for-all.

Only one spill was listed in the afternoon's events. As Grey was piloting "Irish Luck" around a turn in the last lap of the first heat, the craft turned over and threw him into the water. The Irish ship righted itself and shot off across the lake, landing in a bed of tules. The boat was not damaged, but it took some time to remove it from the rushes. Grey reported today.

Floyd House and Joe Meyer were credited with exceptionally good driving in yesterday's contest, which was said to be more evenly matched than the Emigrant dam races.

Winners in the class C race were Joe Meyer with "Irish Luck," first; Floyd House of Medford with "House Afire," second, and Ernie Millot with "Baby Mahoney," third. Art Vroman of Klamath Falls in the "Klamath Flyer," came in fourth, with Jack Terrett of Medford, in "Rogue," fifth.

The second heat ended in the same positions with the exception of Vroman and Terrett, who reversed.

Harold Grey piloted "Irish Luck" to victory in the class D contest, with Floyd House second, and Helme Fluhrer third in "Ceceia." Millot came in fourth. Positions were the same in the second heat.

Millot won the free-for-all, being followed in the first heat by House and Fluhrer. Grey, who started last in the race, was rounding the turn on the last lap close behind Millot, when the boat capsized, eliminating him. In the second heat Millot was followed by Fluhrer, House and Vroman in the order named.

The race program was sponsored by the Klamath Boat club and Klamath Lions club.

LUMBER BUSINESS SHOWS DECREASE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 15.—(AP)—A decrease of 19 per cent in current new business as compared with the previous week was experienced by the western pine industry during the week ending July 9. Production and shipments likewise decreased. Of the 115 mills reporting to the Western Pine association, only 65 were operating, and these at 33.5 per cent of capacity.

Current new business decreased 5,768,000 feet; production was down 8,081,000 feet, and shipments decreased 7,621,000 feet.

Production was 27,322,000 feet; shipments 25,626,000, and orders 24,482,000 feet.
