Reynolds Substitute Hits Homer to Aid in Sixth Straight Win — Indians Scalp Yankees, 11 to 3

By Gayle Talbot. (Associated Press Sports Writer.) Winners of their last six games, the best sport they have made since the first month of the race, the Washington Senators seem to be getting along very nicely without their leading hitter, Carl Reynolds.

Harris hit a home-run with one aboard and Kuehl scored a run yesterday to give the Senators a 5 to 4 verdict over St. Louis in 12 innings. It was only the second victory for Washington in nine bouts with the Browns this season, indicating they are doing at least as well as usual.

Cleveland's Indians, meantime, went right on with their campaign against the yankees "big three," clubbing the yankees into submission, 11 to 3, in the opener at the stadium. That made it five straight for the tribe and 11 out of its last 14 games.

Bill Swift pointed out another good reason for Pittsburgh's leadership of the National League when he set the Boston Braves down, 6 to 1. The rookies gave up only four hits and allowed but one runner to reach third in registering his sixth straight win.

The Chicago Cubs remained two games back by beating the Brooklyn, 4 to 1, behind Guy Stush. The Cardinals' run of four straight wins was ended when the Giants piled into Dizzy Dean in two innings to win, 6 to 3.

TRACK AND FIELD STARS VIE FOR OLYMPIC PLACE

PALO ALTO, Cal., July 15.—(AP)—Out here in the beautiful Santa Clara valley, where athletic speed and brain are among the prime products, America called the roll today of her greatest battalion of track and field warriors for the purpose of picking the Olympic team.

Upon the outcome of these try-outs, including preliminaries today and finals tomorrow, will depend the makeup of shock troops to carry the nation's shield into action in the tenth Olympiad at Los Angeles two weeks hence.

Most of the main arguments, including the Bill Carr-Ben Eastman duel in the 400 meters and the fight of at least a dozen sprint races for the six most coveted places in the dash lineup, will not be settled until Saturday.

The extraordinary class of the field in almost every event has had critics all tangled up in arguments for days, centering around such "naturals" as the Eastman-Carr affair, the sprint rivalry among Tippin, Wyckoff, Metcalfe and Tolani, the challenge of 1,500-meter runners to Gene Venka, the shotput duel between Brix and Sexton, and the high hurdles test among Saling, Beard and Keller, all world record smashers.

Ralph Hill, the Oregon collegian, who set an American outdoor mile record of 4:12 2-8 in 1930, was an outstanding candidate in the 5000-meter run.

BRUNETTE SAYS PISTOL PLAY IS THING OF PAST

CHICAGO, July 15.—(AP)—Bill Jurgens, star Cub shortstop, stepped into court with a timely assist today to save his gun toting girl assistant from prosecution on a charge of assault with intent to kill.

"No, I wish to drop this case," Jurgens replied. "Then the case is dismissed for want of prosecution," ruled the judge. "And let's hope that no more ball players are shot."
